Thoughts from our Supreme Chaplain Assumption of Our Blessed Mother into Heaven by Rev. Andrew S. Hvozdovic

Celebrated every year on August 15. the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary com-

memorates the death of Mary and her bodily assumption into Heaven, before her body could begin to decay--a foretaste of our own bodily resurrection at

the end of time. Because it signifies the Blessed Virgin's passing into eternal life, it is the most important of all Marian feasts and a Holy Day of Obligation.

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into Heaven at the end of her earthly life is a defined dogma of the Catholic Church. On November 1, 1950, Pope Pius XII, exercising papal infallibility declared in Munificentissimus Deus that it is a dogma of the Church "that the Immaculate Mother of God. the ever Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory." As a dogma, the Assumption is a required belief of all Catholics; anyone who publicly dissents from the dogma, Pope Pius declared, "has fallen away completely from the divine and Catholic Faith.'

While the Eastern Orthodox be-

lieve in the Dormition, they object to the papal definition of the dogma, seeing it as unnecessary, since belief in Mary's bodily assumption, tradition holds, goes back to apostolic times.

Pope Pius XII, in the text explaining his definition of the dogma of the Assumption, refers repeatedly to the Blessed Virgin's death before her Assumption, and the consistent tradition in both the East and the West holds that Mary did die before she was assumed into Heaven. However, since the definition of the Assumption is silent on this question. Catholics can legitimately believe that Mary did not die before the Assumption.

24th Slovak Heritage Festival set at the University of Pittsburgh

The Slovak Studies Program at the University of Pittsburgh will host the 24th Slovak Heritage Festival on Sunday, November 2. The annual celebration of Slovak pride will be held in the Commons Room of the Cathedral of Learning located on the university campus in the Oakland section of Pittsburgh from 1 to 5 p.m. This festival was conceived by a group of students who wanted to share their interest in the Slovak and American Slovak culture with the local community. As in previous years, the festival will be the culmination of much hard work, effort and time on behalf of the entire American Slovak community. The festival is the result of the volunteer efforts of all involved in order to promote Slovak heritage.

There will be lectures on the history of Slovak immigration and genealogy, folk art and the Slovaks' participation in World War I, the so-called "Great War" whose centennial we currently commemorate.

Continuing in the long-standing tradition of the festival, a rich cultural program will be featured. Performances will be given by the famed PAS(Pittsburgh Area Slovaks) ensemble, under the capable direction of Angie Lipchick, as well as the Pittsburgh Junior Slovakians and the Pittsburgh Slovakians, under the direction of Sue and Rudy Ondrejco. A colorful exhibit of traditional Slovak dress will feature Helene Cincebeaux's Parade of Krojs. In addition, there will be Slovak-related displays, plenty of Slovak culinary specialities and folk vendors featuring imported items from Slovakia. There is free admission and plenty of free parking. In 1985, five Slovak fraternals, including the Slovak Catholic Sokol, joined together in a fundraising effort to create the only Slovak Studies program in the United States at the University of Pittsburgh. With the initial \$500,000 endowment, the program began as part of the Department of Slavic Languages and Literature. The Slovak Festival looks to celebrate Slovak pride and feature the work of the Slovak Studies Program.

Catasauqua, Pa. Slovak church to be hub of new parish

A letter from the Most Rev. John Barres, Bishop of Allentown, was read at all Masses celebrated in the churches of St. Lawrence and St. Andrew in Catasauqua, Pa. The letter announced that effective this past July 1, 2014, the two parishes would be merged and become the new Parish of St. John Fisher. St. Andrew's Church, which has served the Slovak community since 1902, will be the worship site of the new parish. St. Lawrence Church will no longer be used for worship except in the cases of funerals and for the celebration of Mass on its patronal feast on August 10.

The merger is part of the continuation of the restructuring of parishes called for by the Second Synod of the Allentown Diocese in 2006. Plans in sixteen regions of the diocese went into effect in July 2008, but a plan, which called for the merger of all three Catasauqua parishes, was delayed until such time as the site of the parish was selected. A third parish, Annunciation of the BVM was not part of the consolidation at this time. The Slovak church was chosen as the worship site due to its structural soundness and capacity to house the parish family. The patron of the new parish, St. John Fisher was a 16th century English Bishop who was a fearless defender of religious freedom. He was martyred for opposing King Henry VIII's divorce from Queen Catherine of Aragon and the King's oppression of the Catholic Church.



The Catasauqua Slovak parish has an interesting and successful history. Slovaks began settling in the area in the late 1890s. By 1900, a group of Slovaks organized the St. Andrew's Society which became Branch 157 of the First Catholic Slovak Union. The group petitioned the Archbishop of Philadelphia to establish a parish for the Slovaks in Catasauqua. Permission was officially granted on November 30, 1902 and the parish was placed under the patronage of St. Andrew the Apostle. The Rev. Paul J. Lisicky was welcomed as the first pastor. A number of fine pastors succeeded him. At one time, the parish also had an associate pastor. In later years, property was purchased for a cemetery. While never a large parish, at its peak in the 1950s, the parish numbered about 250 families. Our Sokol, Assembly 72 has been active in the parish for nearly a century.

Until the early 1990s, the parish had its own resident pastor. During those years, the Rev. Michael Stone was appointed as pastor of Blessed Virgin Mary Slovak Parish in Northampton as well as St. Andrew. He resided in Northampton. In April 1992, the Rev. Stephen Radocha(now Monsignor) arrived as pastor of the two churches and remained for the next ten years. Father Radocha's pastorate was a time of renewal and renovation. New activities were initiated and the church building itself was refurbished and restored.

In June 2002, the Rev. William Baker, pastor of St. Lawrence in Catasauqua was appointed pastor of St. Andrew's as well. Since the two churches are only blocks away from one another, this really represents a melding of Catholics from the same neighborhoods who share one common faith. Thus, for the past 12 years St. Andrew and St. Lawrence formed one people in two "sister" parishes. For the past 36 years, since the inception of the annual SS. Cyril and Methodius Appeal of the Slovak Catholic Federation which supports the Church in Slovakia, St. Andrew's Parish has always been a generous supporter.

We pray that God will bless the new faith community of St. John Fisher, located in the church built through the sacrifices of Slovak immigrants and their descendants. We know those of Slovak ancestry will continue to bear witness to their Cyrilo-Methodian heritage of faith within their new family of faith. We thank Brother Stephen Roman, the officers of Assembly 72 as well as Monsignor Stephen Radocha for sharing this story with our readers.

25th anniversary of the Velvet Revolution at New York exhibit

As 2014 marks the 25th anniversary of the Velvet Revolution, the National Czech and Slovak Museum and Library located in Cedar Rapids, Iowa has found a unique way to tell the story of the Communists departure from Czechoslovakia.

To commemorate this milestone in Czech and Slovak history, the National Czech and Slovak Museum and Library's curatorial team has created a traveling exhibit highlighting first-hand experiences of Americans who were in Czechoslovakia during this period. From August 14 thru August 28, a special exhibit titled "Witness to the Revolution" will be featured at the Bohemian National Home located at 321 East 73rd Street in New York City. The exhibit is hosted by the Bohemian Benevolent & Literary Association in cooperation with New York area Slovak organizations. This powerful exhibit offers to tell the story of the fall of Communism in the then Czechoslovakia through a unique and moving lens. 

4th European Beer Tasting Party set





Pavlis: two major firms from Germany to create new jobs in Slovakia

Investors from Germany active in the sphere of engineering are likely to create new jobs in Slovakia, the Economy Minister Pavol Pavlis told TASR in an interview.

"I visited potential investors in Germany two weeks ago. We're waiting for their response now," said Pavlis.

"It's one of the largest companies in the world, and there's a potential that they'll expand their production in Slovakia," said Pavlis, adding that this should take place in two phases. The investors should create around 200 jobs in the first stage, and a further 1,000 jobs in the second phase.

As far as the other investor is concerned, Pavlis said that the management was happy with the locality offered by the Slovak ministry.

"One benefit of this investment consists in the fact that they have a significant interest in cooperation with young people and universities," said Pavlis, adding that the investment concerns jobs with higher added value.

"Another country I want to focus on is Korea. I see a great potential in South Korea, as Slovakia has a good name with Korean companies. They know that Slovakia is stable, and they've already tried out its business parameters," added the economy minister.

50,000 people enjoy 49th folk festival in Detva

More than 50,000 people participated in the 49th annual Folk Festival Under Polana in Detva(Banska Bystrica region of central Slovakia) over the weekend of July 11-13, festival press

secretary Zuzana Juhaniakova told TASR. The town of Detva, which organized the festival, is currently not only evaluating the 49th year, but it has also begun to think about the upcoming 50th festival in 2015.

"This past festival has been one of the most successful ones; only if there hadn't been repeated sound failures. We're trying to spot out the faults in order to prepare for the 50th edition as best as possible," said festival organization committee chair Margita Gajdosova.

A total of almost 1,700 performers were featured in ten scenic and 32 other events at this year's festival.

For the first time, the Folk Festival Under Polana opened the 'gate' of the 'Lower Land Courtyard' as a stage for Slovaks living abroad. Slovaks from Croatia, Romania, Serbia, Hungary, Poland and the Czech Republic performed as part of the program. Several Slovak folk ensembles from the United States and Canada have performed at past Detva festivals.

Turecka hosts Slovak and global Bryndzove halusky championships

A two-day festival celebrating the Slovak national dish 'bryndzove halusky' (potatoe dumplings with bryndza sheep cheese and bacon) that began on July 18 in the mountain village of Turecka(Banska Bystrica region of central Slovakia) was wrapped up as late as early moming on July 20.

According to Turecka mayor Ivan Janovec, at least 5,000 people visited the festival in the village in the Velka Fatra mountains.

The 20th annual Slovak and European Championships in Cooking and Eating of Bryndzove Halusky exceeded our expectations. Those who were not there to experience it, certainly won't believe what they missed," said Janovec.

The championships were divided into two categories with a total of 13, four-member teams taking part in the competition.

The first contest consisted in cooking and eating eight pounds of bryndzove halusky as quickly as possible. Of course, quality of the dish was also taken into account. This year's competition was won by a team called Zupkovski Jedaci(Trenchmen from Zupkov), who cooked the dish in less than 23 minutes and consumed it within 47 seconds.

The other competition entitled 'Thousands of Tastes of Halusky' wasn't about time but exclusively about the quality of the halusky. The competitors could have used ingredients according to their own taste, such as cabbage, eggs and cottage cheese. The contest was won by a team of housewives called 'Majorettes' ahead of the London Team, which also featured an Englishman.

Kiska: Austria was window to another world

Austria was a window into an other world for Slovaks and it was at our common border where we cut the Iron Curtain 25 years ago and where hundreds of thousands of people went freely to the other side of the world for the first time, said Slovak President Andrej Kiska at a press conference after meeting Austrian President Heinz Fischer on July 17.

"Even back then we found a country in Austria with a high quality of life, with the rule of law, where things work, and where we felt comfortable. Today, both our countries are EU members and many of our citizens are living here," Kiska told Fischer, adding that Austria is a source of inspiration for Slovakia in education, state services and respect for the environment.

Kiska also pointed out that Slovakia is an attractive country for Austrian investors, who have officially opened almost 2,500 businesses so far. "Up to 88 percent of them have never regretted their investment," said Kiska

According to Fischer, bilateral relationships between the two countries are developing positively. "The trade balance reached about \$6.7 billion, Austria is the second largest investor in Slovakia," said Fischer. The Austrian president also pointed out that both Slovakia and Austria have profited from Slovakia's accession to the EU. "The fact that our economics have benefited from it is obvious and can be supported by facts and figures," he stated.

Slovaks and Czechs celebrate brotherhood on Velka Javorina Hill

Slovaks and Czechs met up for the annual celebration of Slovak-Czech brotherhood on Velka Javorina hill(Trencin region of central Slovakia) in the White Carpathians on Sunday, July 27, TASR learned on the same day.

"Even though there's been an imaginary border for more than 20 years, these spontaneous meetings of inseparable and close nations are a clear evidence that we stay together in our hearts," said Livia Boorova, spokesperson for the co-organizing town of Stara Tura.

This year's meeting has been held in the spirit of the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of World War I, during which time the idea to form a joint state of Czechs and Slovaks emerged. "It was after World War I, which claimed many lives, that our joint history began to be written," said Boorova.

After representatives of neighboring municipalities across the border officially met up, a large audience was treated to an array of folklore performances. The event has been taking place at the monument to Czech, Moravian and Slovak Solidarity on Velka Javorina hill annually since Czechoslovakia split in 1993.

Study: one third of motocyclists killed between '92 & '12 had been drinking

Almost one-third of the motorcyclists who were killed in accidents in Slovakia between 1992 and 2012 were driving under the influence of alcohol, a study by Dr. Martin Janik from the Forensic Insitute of Comenius University's Jessenius Medical Faculty has revealed.

As many as 91 percent of the 311 killed were men. Two-

Selected stories are provided by TASR-Slovakia, the Slovak Republic's official News Agency. thirds of them died at the scene of the accidents, while 54 percent of the incidents involved crashes with other vehicles and 28 percent with static objects, such as trees, poles and crash barriers. A total of 18 percent of the motorcyclists died following a fall.

Meanwhile, 91 of the motorcyclists(29 percent) were under the influence of alcohol.

"The brain and lungs were the most frequently injured internal organs," said Janik, adding that in as many as 137 cases, death was caused by skull and brain damage.

Janik further reported that around 6,000 motorcyclists die on European roads annually, while the figure stands at around 25-30 in Slovakia.

According to Janik, if a motorcyclist crashes into a solid object at a speed of 10-12 kilometers(5 to 10 miles per hour), only slight injuries may be expected, but if the speed is twice as high, the injuries can already prove fatal. "A crash at 80-90 kilometers(50 to 60 miles per hour) causes injuries that are virtually incompatible with life," added Janik.



The tradition of pilgrimage has been an important aspect of our Catholic faith in Slovakia. Pilgrims journey to a holy place to seek an encounter with God. The first Benedictine monastery was established in the year 1020 founded at Skalka near Trencin in central Slovakia. This monastery was founded by St. Andrew Svorad and his student St. Benedict Skalka. St. Andrew Svorad died in 1030 and his remains are interred in the Cathedral of St. Emeran in Nitra. He is the patron of the Slovak Benedictine abbey in Cleveland, Oh. Skalka became an abbey in the year 1224. This monastery, located on a high promontory point, is the oldest pilgrimage site in Slovakia. The present abbey church dates from 1853. During the Communist period, the church and grounds fell into ruin. Following the fall of Communism and the independence of Slovakia, the monastery church and grounds were restored in 2000 and today the Monastery of St. Benedict Skalka is once again one of the most popular pilgrimage sites in Slovakia. During the summer months, many pilgrimages are held here, especially around the feast of SS. Andrew Svorad and Benedict which is observed on July 17.

37th New Jersey Slovak Heritage Festival set for September 28

All is in readiness for this year's exciting 37th annual New Jersey Slovak Heritage Festival set for Sunday, September 28 at the PNC Bank Arts Center in Holmdel, NJ. The festival this year commemorates the 450th anniversary of the great Shrine of Our Mother of Sorrows dedicated to Slovakia's patroness in Sastin.

Festivities begin at 10 a.m. with an array of colorful and interesting exhibits celebrating Slovak culture and heritage in the Garden State. A concelebrated Mass will be celebrated at 11 a.m. Celebrant and guest of honor at this year's festival will be the Most Rev. Peter A. Libasci, Bishop of Manchester, N.H. Bishop Libasci, a New York native, is active in the American Slovak community. His maternal grandparents were natives of eastern Slovakia. He was ordained a priest of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, N.Y. in 1978. Pope Benedict XVI appointed him an Auxiliary Bishop of the diocese in 2007. In 2012, he was appointed Bishop of Manchester.

The Mixing Bowl

APPLESAUCE SCONES

2/3 cup applesauce 1/3 cup buttermilk 1/4 cup oleo, melted 1 tsp. vanila extract 1 tsp. honey 2 cups all-purpose flour 1/4 tsp. baking soda 2 tsp. baking powder 1/4 tsp. salt Dash grated nutmeg 1/2 cup raisins 1 tsp. oleo, melted

Cinnamon sugar

Preheat oven to 425degreesF. Line a baking sheet with aluminum foil and lightly grease. In a medium-sized bowl, combine applesauce, buttermilk, margarine, vanilla extract and honey. Set aside. In another medium-sized bowl, combine flour, baking soda, baking powder, salt, nutmeg and raisins.

Combine applesauce mixture with flour mixture with floured hands, knead gently and turn out on to a flouered surface. Pat dough to 1/2-inch thickness and cut into 8 triangle shapes. Arrange on baking sheet 1/4-inch apart. Brush with one tablespoon melted margarine and sprinkle with cinnamon sugar. Bake 12 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Makes 8 scones.

LACE COOKIES

- 1/2 pound butter
- 1 cup dark brown sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 heaping tbsp. flour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- or black walnuts

Cream butter, add sugar and mix thoroughly. Add egg and again beat thoroughly. Stir in flour and flavoring. Lightly fold in nuts. Drop by half teaspoonful on very lightly greased cookie sheet - at least three inches apart. Bake in slow oven at 275degreesF until they begin to brown, then let them cool on the cookie sheet for two minutes before removing each one separately with

PRUNE-FILLED SOUR CREAM SQUARES

4 cups flour

a spatula.

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 pound butter
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 pint sour cream
- 4 egg yolks

Sift dry ingredients and add butter. Work with hands just like for pie crust. When mixture is like fine cornmeal, add 4 eggs and 1/2 pint sour cream. Work gently until egg yolks are blended. Roll 1/4 inch on lightly floured board. Dough is soft and may be hard to lift. Line the bottom of pan with dough.

Filling

2 lbs. prunes, cooked and mashed

1 cup crushed pineapple(drained) sugar to taste. You may add walnuts or coconut if desired.

Spread generously over dough. Roll another piece of dough out into strips 1 inch wide - lay strips lengthwise and cross wise.(Make a lattice top). Brush top with egg white or whole egg beaten, sprinkle with nuts. Makes two 8-inch pyrex pans or large cookie sheet. Bake 375degreesF for 30 minutes or until delicately brown.

You may use apricot, cherry or whatever type of filling you desire. It is much easier to divide the dough into 4 equal parts and instead of rolling, pat it in the pan and on top.

Chocolate Nut Loaf

- 2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 cup butter or shortening
- 2 cups sugar
- 5 eggs
- 1 cup broken walnuts
- $2 \frac{1}{2}$ squares unsweetened
- chocolate melted
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 tsps. vanilla

Sift flour, add soda and salt together, 3 times. Cream butter, add sugar gradually and cream together until light and fluffy. Beat eggs until very thick and light. Add to cream mixture and beat well. Add nuts and chocolate and blend. Add flour alternately with sour cream, a small amount at a time. Beat after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla. Bake in greased pan, 1 hour 20 minutes at 325degreesF or until done.

SHISHKY - RAISED LEKVAR DOUGHNUTS

- 1/4 pound butter 6 egg yolks
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tsp. lemon rind
- $2 \frac{1}{2}$ cups lukewarm milk
- 1 cake yeast
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 6 cups flour

Warm 1/2 cup of milk, add 1 teaspoon sugar, yeast, and sprinkle with a little flour. Let stand for 10 minutes. When raised, add to the flour.

Mix butter, egg yolks and 1 teaspoon sugar together. Add 2 cups of milk, salt, lemon rind, vanilla and knead in mixing bowl for about 20 minutes until dough does not stick to hands.

Let dough rise for two or three hours or until double in thickness. Cover with cloth. Dough will rise faster. Roll on floured board to one-half inch thickness.

Cut with cutter, put one-half teaspoon of lekvar in center, cover with another circle of dough, press together and cut around edge to shape doughnut. Let rise 1/2 hour until doubled in bulk and fry in hot fat until golden brown. Sprinkle with confectioner's sugar when cool.

".... in the new code of laws which I suppose it will be necessary for you to make, I desire you would remember the ladies and be more generous and favorable to them than your ancestors. Do not put such unlimited power into the hands of husbands. Remember, all men would be tyrants if they could. If particular care and attention is not paid to the ladies, we are determined to foment a rebellion, and will not hold ourselves bound by any laws in which we have no voice or representation.."

Munch a Mouthful

You want to munch some something, but you're counting calories. So what's to eat?

For almost no calories per serving, you can snack on celery sticks, lettuce, cucumbers, green peppers, mushrooms, cauliflower, or broccoli.

For 25-30 calories, choose 1 small tangerine, 1/2 cup watermelon, 1/4 cantaloupe, 1 small tomato, 1 medium carrot, 1 cup plain popcorn, or 12 pretzel sticks.

For 35-40 calories, eat 1 medium peach, 1 medium nectarine, 1/2 grapefruit, 1/2 cup skim milk, 1/4 cup plain yogurt, 3 saltine crackers, or 1/2 small banana.

Ako dodal, peniaze na rekonštrukciu nepôjdu len z ministerstva obrany, ale aj z externých zdrojov, napríklad z európskych fondov.

Záujem o využívanie výcvikového centra sa zvyšuje.

"Došlo k nárastu o 65 percent oproti minulému roku. Postupne sa nám hlásia rôzne jednotky, prevažne sú to špeciálne jednotky z členských krajín NATO, aby využívali tento priestor," uviedol zástupca riaditeľa Centra výcviku Lešť Branislav Benka.

Rekonštrukciou a modernizáciou strelnice vznikne moderná multifunkčná strelnica so sektorom pre ostreľovačov a pre výcvik dynamickej streľby.

Cvičisko trhania a mínovania je určené na výcvik vojsk so zameraním na prácu s ostrými trhavinami, najmä s ich odstraňovaním a bezpečným ničením.

Dlhodobým problémom sú najmä ubytovacie kapacity.

"Snažíme sa v tom skoordinovať, aby sme všetkým mohli vyjsť v ústrety. Ubytovacie kapacity sú klůčové do budúcna," uviedol šéf rezortu obrany Glváč.

Preto vybudujú stanový tábor, ktorý zabezpečí dlhodobé požiadavky cvičiacich jednotiek, a to najmä v spojitosti s taktickou prípravou.

Obdobné ubytovacie zariadenia sa totiž používajú v operáciách medzinárodného krízového manažmentu.

O slovenský pas prišlo 865 ľudí

Minister vnútra Robert Kaliňák dlhodobo zastáva názor, že druhé štátne občianstvo by sa malo viazať na trvalý pobyt v inom štáte. V tom prípade by ľudia nestrácali slovenský pas. Už v minulosti takýto postup označil za najväčší štandard vo svete.

Mostu-Híd Béla Líder Bugár však s riešením, o ktorom hovoril Kaliňák nesúhlasí. Zdôraznil, že mnoho ľudí stratilo občianstvo a väčšinou to neboli ľudia, ktorí prijali občianstvo Maďarska. "Novela, ktorú pripravuje minister Kaliňák, je diskriminácia. Mnoho občanov z južného Slovenska študuje v Maďarsku a má tam päť rokov prechodné bydlisko. Dokonca, keď si zoberú občianstvo, majú tam aj výhody," povedal Pravde Bugár. Podľa neho v nevýhode sú aj ľudia z juhu Slovenska, ktorí pracujú v blízkych továrňach za hranicami a potom sa ich aj prepúšťanie z práce dotkne skôr ako občanov s maďarským pasom. "Je to problém ľudí, ktorí majú zakódovaný strach v hlave. Čoho sa boja?" spýtal sa šéf Mostu-Híd.

Novelu zákona o občianstve prijatú za prvej Ficovej vlády napadli poslanci na Ústavnom súde ešte v roku 2011. Tvrdili, že je v rozpore s ústavou a s medzinárodnými dohovormi. Podľa nich nemožno nikoho zbaviť štátneho občianstva proti jeho vôli, o čom hovorí aj ústava. O budúcnosti spornej novely sa má rozhodnúť po letných prázdninách. Hovorkyňa Ústavného súdu Anna Pančurová Pravde povedala, že na 17. september je naplánované pojednávanie, na ktorom by malo byť vyhlásené rozhodnutie.

Počet dusných dní sa na Slovensku zvyšuje

Počet dusných dní za rok sa na Slovensku postupne zvyšuje. Informoval o tom Slovenský hydrometeorologický ústav (SHMÚ) na svojej internetovej stránke. Vzostup tohto fenoménu zaznamenali na celom území Slovenska.

V Poprade v 50-tych rokoch, keď sa s monitorovaním začalo, nepresiahol počet dusných dní päť. V súčasnosti sa priemerný počet dusných dní v meste blíži k číslu 20. Nárast počtu dusných dní zaznamenali aj meteorologické stanice v Telgárte, Kamenici na Cirochou, v Čadci, na Sliači alebo v Košiciach. Priemerný počet dusných dní na Slovensku za rok sa v súčasnosti pohybuje okolo čísla 30.

Dusno predstavuje subjektívny nepríjemný pocit vyvolaný kombinovaným účinkom vyššej teploty a vyššej relatívnej vlhkosti vzduchu na ľudský organizmus pri slabom vetre. Vyskytuje sa najmä pred búrkami. Hranicou pre pocit dusna je podľa SHMÚ pri relatívnej vlhkosti vzduchu 100 percent už teplota 16,5 stupňa Celzia, pri relatívnej vlhkosti 50 percent teplota 27,9 stupňa Celzia a pri vlhkosti 30 percent 36,9 stupňa Celzia.

Keďže ide o subjektívny pocit meteorológovia hranicu dusna presne stanovili na základe jednej z vlhkostných charakteristík, a to takzvaného tlaku vodnej pary. V meteorológii je dusný deň na meteorologickej stanici zaznamenaný v prípade ak je o 14:00 miestneho času nameraný tlak vodnej pary 18,8 hektopascala a vyššou. Fenomén dusna je charakteristický hlavne pre nížinaté oblasti. V nadmorských výškach viac ako 1000 metrov sa vyskytuje len výnimočne.

Slávnostné otvorenie 50. ročníka letnej školy Studia Academica Slovaca

V pondelok 4. augusta 2014 sa v Aule Univerzity Komenského v Bratislave sa konalo slávnostné otvorenie jubilejného 50. ročníka letnej školy slovenského jazyka a kultúry Studia Academica Slovaca (SAS).

SAS tento rok privíta 179 účastníkov z 38 krajín sveta, ktorí sa budú od 3. do 23. augusta 2014 učiť slovenčinu a spoznávať slovenskú kultúru i krajinu.

Najviac účastníkov prichádza na Slovensko z Nemecka (18), nasledujú Poľsko, Rakúsko a Taliansko (po 12 účastníkov) a Maďarsko (s 11 zástupcami). Slovenčinu sa budú učiť aj frekventanti z USA, Kanady, Japonska, Číny, Egypta, Španielska či Argentíny. Najstarší účastník tohtoročnej letnej školy má 69 rokov a pochádza z USA. Naopak, najmladšou je 18-ročná Ruska.

Letná škola SAS je najstaršou letnou jazykovou školou na Slovensku, ktorá existuje od roku 1965 a od roku 1966 nesie názov Studia Academica Slovaca. SAS si na rozdiel od iných letných jazykových kurzov do dnešných dní zachováva profil slovakistických akademických štúdií.

Vojaci už začali rozoberať slovenskú základňu v Kandaháre

Slovenskí vojaci, ktorí v rámci operácia ISAF v Afganistane pôsobia na leteckej základni v Kandaháre, už začali s likvidáciou svojej základne.

Dôvodom je ukončenie operácie ISAF, ktoré je naplánované na koniec roka. Informuje o tom webstránka Ozbrojených síl.

Ako prvú rozobrali vojaci spoločenskú miestnosť - Slovak House, ktorá bola symbolom slovenskej základne.

"Tento priestor sa stal reprezentačným priestorom pre mnohé rotácie slovenských jednotiek. Bol miestom prijímania zahraničných návštev, miestom nespočetných porád jednotiek, bol aj bohoslužobným priestorom," informujú vojaci.

V rámci sťahovania z misie vlani priviezli späť na Slovensko okolo 600 ton materiálu.

Tento rok už približne 83 ton a do konca roka majú naplánovaných ešte asi 190.

Armáda využíva na presun materiálu najmä program NATO s názvom SALIS (Strategic Airlift Interim Solution).

Na prepravu sa využíva nákladné lietadlo Antonov 124-100, ktoré môže odviesť až 120 ton nákladu. - *TASR*

Zákon o občianstve politici naprávajú už štyri roky, kedy sa však dostane vláde na stôl v novej podobe, je stále nejasné. V súčasnosti platí, že ak slovenský občan nadobudne občianstvo cudzieho štátu, o slovenské príde.

Rezort vnútra má už novelu zákona pripravenú, teraz sa s ňou zaoberajú na ministerstve zahraničných vecí. To tvrdí, že posudzuje viaceré medzinárodnoprávne aspekty, ako aj dosah novely. Zriadilo expertnú skupinu, ktorá na nej pracuje. "Konzultácie prebiehajú na viacerých úrovniach, zákon má predsa oveľa širšiu pôsobnosť ako len pre tých, ktorí sa rozhodnú prijať maďarské občianstvo," uviedol riaditeľ tlačového odboru ministerstva zahraničných vecí Peter Susko.

Pôvodné plány boli, že zmeny v občianstve kabinet prijme ešte do letných prázdnin. predlžovanie termínu schválenia zákona tak spôsobuje, že ustavične pribúda osôb, ktoré sa museli vzdať postavenia občana SR. Podľa údajov ministerstva vnútra k piatku 25. júla stratilo od júla 2010 slovenské občianstvo 865 ľudí, z toho je 491 žien a zvyšok sú muži. Zákon sa najviac dotkol osôb, ktoré prijali občianstvo Českej republiky. Ide

o 326 ľudí. Nasleduje Nemecko

173, Rakúsko 121, Veľká Britá-

nia 75, Maďarsko 55 osôb. Kauza s občianstvom vznikla po prijatí zákona v Maďarsku, ktoré umožnilo uchádzať sa o občianstvo aj bez podmienky trvalého pobytu. Prvá vláda Roberta Fica reagovala vlastnou novelou. Po 17. júli 2010 každý, kto prijal cudzie občianstvo, stratil slovenské. S neúspechom sa skončili všetky pokusy napraviť tento stav za bývalej vlády a problém pretrval dodnes.

Warren Buffett dá prácu stovkám Slovákov

Švajšiarska spoločnosť Swiss Re, ktorej vlastníkom je americký miliardár Warren Buffet, rozširuje svoj biznis na Slovensku a plánuje vytvoriť až 400 nových pracovných miest. Momentálne zemestnáva na Slovensku osemsto ľudí.

Swiss Re na Slovensku pôsobí od roku 2007, jej bizniscentrum poskytuje pre centrálu podporu v daniach a vo financiách či v informačných technológiách (IT) a manažmente klientov.

Spoločnosť plánuje rozšíriť svoje centrum zdieľaných služieb. Dôvodom rozšírenia je dobré podnikateľské prostredie a kvalifikovaná pracovná sila. Úlohu zohráva aj geografická poloha.

"Pozitívna spätná väzba od Swiss Re by mohla byť impulzom pre príchod ďalších firiem," myslí si analytik J&T Banky Stanislav Pánis. Jeho slová potvrdzuje aj Slovenská agentúra pre rozvoj investícií a obchodu (SARIO), ktorá už rokuje so štyrmi firmami, ktoré zvažujú na Slovensku investovať práve v tejto brandži. "Spolu by mohli vytvoriť až 400 nových pracovných miest," reagoval PR konzultant štátnej agentúry Richard Dírer. Práve Slovensko sa vďaka tomuto biznisu stáva jednou z top destinácií.

To, že Świss Re na Slovensku expanduje, potvrdzuje aj pracovný portál Profesia.sk, kde Švajčiari avizujú 35 pracovných ponúk v oblasti bankovníctva a finančníctva. Hľadajú tiež ľudí, ktorí chcú pracovať v informačných technológiách a v oblasti personalistiky.

V čase krízy do Swiss Re Warren Buffett investoval 2 miliardy eur. Švajčiarska zaisťovňa a jedna z popredných firiem vo finančnom svete sa tak mohla udržať medzi elitou. Warren Buffett je tretí najbohatší muž na svete, jeho majetok má hodnotu 61,9 miliardy USD, je zakladateľ a top akcionár investičnej firmy Berkshire Hathaway.

Krátke správy zo Slovenska

Tri roky po havárii lietadla s výpravou Lokomotivu Jaroslavľ vznikol film o tragicky zosnulom slovenskom hokejistovi Pavlovi Demitrovi. Ukážky z dokumentu "Pavol Demitra: 38", ktorý bude mať premiéru 7. septembra v Trenčíne, priniesla aj oficiálna webstránka NHL.

Film zachytáva jednotlivé momenty zo života Demitru. Prvá časť sa venuje jeho kariére v NHL, druhá jeho pôsobeniu v národnom tíme. Tretiu časť nahrali počas cesty na miesto leteckého nešťastia, ktoré sa Demitrova manželka Mária odhodlala prvýkrát navštíviť až počas nakrúcania filmu.

Česká zbrojovka bude spolu so slovenským partnerom MSM Martin vyrábať na Slovensku ručné zbrane. Ich spoločný podnik CZ-Slovensko otvorili 14. júla v Novákoch premiéri Česka a Slovenska Bohuslav Sobotka a Rober Fico.

□ V Košickom kraji sa rodí v rámci celého Slovenska najviac predčasne narodených detí, je to 12 percent zo všetých pôrodov. Dobrou správou však je, že zlepšením pôrodníckej a novorodeneckej starostlivoti v spojení so zvyšujúcou sa dostupnosťou moderných technológií, sa počet úmrtí predčasne narodených detí znižuje.

□ Priemerná cena nehnuteľhostí na bývanie sa na Slovensku po jej miernom zvýšení na začiatu tohro roku v druhom kvartáli znížila o 10 eur za meter štvorcový na 1 211 eur. Informovala o tom Národná banka Slovenska. Znemaná to medzikvartálny pokles o 0,8 percenta a v medziročnom porovnaní je to zníženie o 1,5 percenta.

Slováci utekajú z Líbye, kde už niekoľko týždňov bojujú znepriatelené milície. Keď že Slovensko nemá v africkej krajine svoj zastupiteľský úrad, s presunom Slovákov do bezpečia pomáhajú Poľsko a Taliansko. Podľa informácií Ministerstva zahraničných vecí SR bolo v Líbyi približne 20 Slovákov, ktorí tam majú trvalý pobyt.

□ Vyhrotené vzťahy medzi Ruskom a Ukrajinou majú dosah aj na slovenský cestovný ruch. Počet žiadostí o víza v týchto krajinách sa prepadol oproti minulému roku o tisíce. Celkovo Ukrajinci podali 28 349 žiadostí o víza, čo je prepad oproti minulámu roku o 25-tisíc. V Rusku podalo 10 759 žiadostí, čo je o 5 000 menej ako za rovnaký čas vlani.

□ Tohoročný júl sa zapísal na Slovensku ako búrkový. Na celom území meteorológovia zaznamenali až 29 dní s búrkami. Len dva dni bolo Slovensko bez búrkovej činnosti. Najviac búrok sa vyskytlo na Sliači (18), v Bratislave (16), v Dolnom Hročove a Poprade (15).

□ V Hondurase prepadli muži troch slovenských misionárov tesne po tom, ako vybrali z banky asi 10-tisíc dolárov, ktoré boli určené na výstavbu kaplnky Božieho milosrdenstva v Misijnom centre v Sangrelayi.

□ Na Slovensku žije viac ľudí bez vyznania, ako ukázalo sčítanie obyvateľov v roku 2011. Kým podľa výsledkov sčítania je bez vyznania 13,4 percenta Slovákov, výskum Sociologického ústavu Slovenskej akadémie vied (SAV) s názvom Demokratickosť a občania na Slovensku hovorí až o 21,88 percenta.

Z výsledkov sčítania vyplýva, že 10,6 percenta obyvateľov nevedelo alebo neodpovedalo na otázku, k akému náboženskému vyznaniu sa hlásia. Sociologický výskum znížil toto číslo na 1,42 percenta. Výskum sa konal od 29. mája do 8. júna na vzorke 1 215 respondentov. Dáta zbierala a spracovala agentúra Focus.
