Athletes from nine participating Groups compete at biennial Meet at Slippery Rock University, July 14-18



The 47th International Slet was held at Slippery Rock University in Slippery Rock, Pennsylvania the week of July 11 2016.

The week started on Monday for the Physical Fitness Board. The afternoon was spent checking all dormitory rooms before participants started arriving the next morning. The rest of the day included meeting with the director of camps at

Slippery rock, making signs, going over the weeks activities and finishing all the last minute details to make the week flow as smoothly as possible. As requested by several groups, the Supreme Physical Fitness board changed the Slet schedule around from previous Slets so that we could do track at night and drills in the afternoon to avoid the heat of the day. These schedule changes proved to be a benefit for

everyone and we received positive feedback.

The Slet began bright and early Tuesday morning with the arrival of nine participating groups: Group 1- Passaic, N.J

There were a total of 231 participants that attended our International Slet. Helping to chaperone the week's activities along with the group's chaperones, sports directors, physical directors and directresses and their assistants were Rev. Andrew Hvozdovic and Rob Palchanis. Both did a wonderful job in keeping the participants safe and on time to their events.

Beginning at 10:00am and con-

tinuing throughout the day was the individual drill competition. At 2:00PM a meeting was held with the Supreme Physical Fitness Board, Group Physical Directors Directresses and assistants, sports Directors and Chaperones to go over the Slet schedule, general rules and regulations and any changes that would be occurring.

The opening ceremonies began with the grand march of all the groups. Following the grand march was a mass celebrated by Supreme Chaplain, Rev. Andrew Hvozdovic. Following the opening mass was a speech from the Supreme President, Larry Glugosh. One of the highlights of opening ceremonies was at the lighting of the torch to signify the opening of the 47th International Slet. Each participating group chose 2 participants, one male and one female, to represent their group in caring the torch. The 18 participants were lined up around the track. The torches were lit and slowly the participants headed around the track handing off their torches to the next group waiting. Following our beautiful opening ceremony, the volleyball competition was held in the Morrow Field House. An intense competition ended with Group 3 and Group 5 advancing to the final competition on Thursday afternoon. While the volleyball competition was occurring, the participants 12 and under were participating in volleyball and soccer challenges in the Grass Tek area of the gym.

Wednesday morning began with the track competition. The weather was perfect and the talent of the athletes was apparent. Some of the events included the distance runs and field events.

The afternoon began with the junior individual drill finals and continued with the senior drill competition in the Morrow Field House. The senior women performed to two songs: "Horehronie" by Kristina Pelakova and "Roar" by Katy Perry. The senior men performed to "Fazula" music orchestrated by Samo Smetana and performed by his band Banda and to the music from the move "Batman Begins (2010)." The judges relayed to the Supreme Physical Fitness Board that the competition was close and the preparation and dedication to drills was obvious. Everyone attending the competition was impressed with the performances. The senior women drill winner was Group 19 and the senior men drill winner was Group 5.

The gymnastics competition was held Wednesday evening at Butler gymnastics. There were 24 male gymnasts and 48 female gymnasts. The facility was very accommo-

A total of \$3,400 was raised from Sokol lodges, individual members as well as other societies and presented to the Wounded Warrior Project(WWP) during the 32nd national convention. Daniel Borecki, the representative of the Wounded Warrior Project in accepting the donation, expressed thanks and gratitude to the Slovak Catholic Sokol for its support of their efforts to honor and empower wounded warriors. The organization's purpose is to raise awareness and enlist the public's aid for the needs of injured service members, help injured service members aid and assist each other, and provide unique, direct programs and services to meet the needs of injured service members. In addition to physical wounds, it is estimated that as many as 400,000 service members live with the invisible wounds of war including combat-related stress, major depression and post-traumatic stress disorder. Another 320,000 are believed to have experienced a traumatic brain injury while on deployment. In his address to the convention delegates, Mr. Borecki, who is of Slovak ancestry, commended the Slovak Catholic Sokol for its interest and support of the Wounded Warrior Project in the best traditions of fraternal outreach and caring. 38th New Jersey Slovak Heritage Festival set for September 27

All is in readiness for this year's exciting 38th annual New Jersey Slovak Heritage Festival scheduled for Sunday, September 27 at the PNC Bank Arts Center in Holmdel, N.J. Serving as Festival chairpersons are well-known Slovak cultural activists and our Sokol members, Nina Holy and John G. Duch. This

year's festival celebrates the strong ties between the Slovak community in the United States and their brethren in their homeland In particular we celebrate the centennial of the signing of the Cleveland Agreement, the first attempt by the American Slovak and Czech communities in the effort at liberating their brethren in their ancestral homeland. The Cleveland Agreement was an important document in the creation of the first Czecho-Slovak Republic in 1918 and the eventual indepen-

dence of Slovakia and the Czech Republic on January 1, 1993.

Festivities begin at 10 a.m. with an array of colorful and interesting exhibits celebrating Slovak culture and heritage in the Garden State. At 11 a.m. a Pontifical concelebrated Liturgy in the Byzantine Rite will be offered by the Most Rev. John Pazak, C.Ss.R., Eparch of SS.Cyril and Methodius of Slovaks of the Byzantine Rite in Canada. Bishop Pazak a well-known Slovak spiritual leader was celebrant of the liturgy at the 35th Slovak Festival in 2013. This year's Byzantine Liturgy celebrates the rich Greek Catholic traditions of Slovakia. In addition, it recognizes the many Americans of Slovak ancestry who are Byzantine Catholic. The homilist in Slovak at the liturgy will be the Rev. Martin Vavrak, pastor of St. Nicholas Byzantine Catholic Parish in Perth Amboy, N.J. Following the liturgy, an array of Slovak culinary specialities, including pirohy, bryndzove halusky, holupky, langose(deep fried dough with garlic and cheese, klobasy and kapusta, gulas, roast pig, palacinky, as well as traditional American favorites will be available through out the

The popular cultural program begins at 2 p.m. with the Parade of Slovak Fashions and Folklore under the directions of our Sokolky, Renata Vasilova and Jane Konzelman. Participants, women, men and children display the traditional Slovak dress or Kroj of their ancestral villages and regions of Slovakia, making for a colorful and interesting display. Some participants don the kroj of their ancestors which they brought with them when they emigrated to the United States more than a century ago. Presentations by various area Slovak folk ensembles will display the rich music and dance traditions of Slovakia. There will be a traditional Slovak sing-along and presenters will perform on native Slovak instruments. Music and dancing pleasure will continue until 6 p.m. with the artistry of the Joseph Jurasi Band.

The traditional Slovak Festival Soccer Match will pit various soccer clubs from the New Jersey and New York metropolitan area. In addition, there will be an array of rides and games for the children throughout the afternoon. There's something for every member of the family at this year's festival. Combined with free admission and plenty of free parking, the festival is a wonderful opportunity to enjoy a Sunday afternoon of Slovak pride and heritage. The PNC Bank Arts Center is conveniently located off Exit 116 of the Garden State Parkway in Holmdel, N.J.

Sokols and Sokolky have been a part of the New Jersey Slovak Heritage Festival from its earliest years. The first festival was held in May 1976 as part of the celebration of the American Bicentennial with the late Albin J. Stolarik of Passaic serving as the first chairman. Beginning in 1977, the late Joseph J. Talafous of Jersey City became festival chairman and continued in this capacity for more than 20 years. Since 2000, festival chairpersons have been Nina Holy and John G. Duch. Over the years, many prominent Slovak personalities have participated in these festivals including Slovakia's President Ivan Gasparovic who visited on three occasions.

30th Annual Midwest Pastoral Seminar on September 20

The first Slovak Benedictine in America, the Rev. Gregory Vaniscak was a monk of St. Procopius Abbey which had been established to serve the Czech community. Father Gregory, considered the founder of the Cleveland Slovak Benedictine Abbey, served for many years at St. Michael the Archangel Parish, Chicago's first Slovak parish. In 1922, several Slovak Benedictines left St. Procopius to begin their missionary efforts among the Cleveland area Slovaks. In 1934, the Slovak Benedictine community in Cleveland was elevated to the status of an Abbey. Since then, the Slovak Benedictines have enjoyed an important role in the life of the American Slovak community. Abbey Gary is the seventh Abbot of St. Andrew Svorad Abbey.

Following the presentation, a delicious familystyle luncheon and program will be enjoyed. Cost of the seminar and luncheon is \$25.00 per person. Advance reservations only. Reservations made after September 10 are \$30.00 per person. No reservations at the door. Mark 7:1-8.14-15.21-23

When the Pharisees with some scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus, they observed that some of his disciples ate their meals with unclean, that is, unwashed hands.-For the Pharisees and, in fact, all Jews, do not eat without carefully, washing their hands, keeping the tradition of the elders. U.S. Military Convoy to move via Slovakia in September

A convoy of American military vehicles set to travel from Germany to a military exercise in Hungary in September is to pass through Slovakia, Defense Ministry spokesperson Martina Ballekova informed TASR on August 7.

She added that the ministry and the Americans are currently discussing details of the movement - including the number of vehicles and the specific date.

"It will be standard movement of equipment to an Alliance(NATO) exercise in Hungary," said Bellekova, adding that the ministry will inform the public about conclusions of the discussions.

The convoy will likely feature 'Stryker' armored fighting vehicles. It's the same armored vehicle used in the Operation Dragoon Ride in March, which involved an almost 1,500 mile journey from Estonia to a military base near Vilseck in Germany.

According to Ballekova, U.S. military vehicles will also take part in the military exercise Slovak Shield, which is planned for September 8 to October 2 in the Lest training area(Banska Bystrica region). The exercise this year will focus on NATO member countries territorial integrity protection. Aside from Slovaks and Americans, the exercise will also be attended by Czech, Hungarian and Polish troops.

According to the ministry, foreign troops' movement via Slovakia is an ordinary activity stemming from Slovakia's membership in NATO. "Slovak Armed Forces troops and equipment travel through NATO member states area in the same way," said Ballekova.

Analyst Robert Ondrejcsak, director of the Center for European and North Atlantic Affairs(CENAA), agrees with Ballekova and points out that in recent years not only American but also other EU and NATO member states' troops have moved through Slovakia.

Ondrejcsak expects that joint exercise with the allies will intensify in the future given the conflict in Ukraine as well as the end of the NATO-led International Security Assistance Force(ISAF) security mission in Afghanistan that ended last year. As Odrejcsak pointed out, interoperability is of key importance for the allies and it can only be maintained by joint exercise. "For this reason, allied troops will appear here in the future - even in greater numbers, I assume." he added.

Kazimir: boost of Slovakia's ratings by S&P is reward for healthy finances

The improvement of Slovakia's ratings by Standard & Poor's(S&P) from A to A+ on August 1 is a welcome reward for Slovakia having put its public finances in order in a sustainable manner, Finance Minister Peter Kazimir stated on August 2.

S&P on August 1 increased Slovakia's rating to A+ with a stable outlook. The return of Slovakia's rating to the precrisis level is a clear expression of trust in the Slovak Government's economic and budgetary policies, said Kazimir.

Meanwhile, S&P expects that Slovakia's economy will grow by slightly more than 3 percent in the period 2015-18, a development that will contribute towards reduction of both public deficit and debt. Slovakia's economic growth rate should be twice that of the eurozone level in 2015 and 2016. This may help to reduce unemployment, which is the biggest challenge for the government after it has introduced measures to consolidate the state budget, according to S&P.

The rating agency believes that the government's ambition to have a balanced budget in 2017 is realistic. If this indeed takes place, S&P stated that it may even further improve Slovakia's rating.

Kazimir noted that Slovakia has now the ninth best rating from among 19 eurozone members.

International stars featured at organ festival at Bratislava cathedral

Historic St. Martin's Cathedral in Bratislava hosted an international Cathedral Organ Festival which featured concerts every Thursday and Sunday which began on July 30. These concerts will continue thru September 30.

Renowned musicians from Spain, Switzerland, Norway, Sweden, Italy and Germany perform at the festival, which was opened on July 30 by Slovak organist Stanislav Surin accompanied by soprano Jana Pastorkova and Polish violinist Mariusz Monczak. Their program included works by Slovak and Polish composers, Henryk Gorecki, Mikulas Schneider-Trnavsky and Vladimir Godar.

"For the first time the festival will feature the excellent Swede Hans Fagius, who became famous, among other things, for a complete recording of Johann Sebastian Bach's organ opus," TASR was told by Surin, who is active in a civil association called Tribus Musicae.

Slovak Monika Melcove, who has an excellent reputation among organists abroad will appear at the festival with Spanish countertenor Carlos Mena. "This unique artist has sung on the most renowned stages worldwide and is among the best countertenors of his generation," said Surin.

The festival will be concluded on September 10 by a recital by German artist Stefan Kagl, who is widely considered to be an expert on Bach and Cesar Franck.

The Cathedral Organ Festival is part of the city's cultural summer program and the Bratislava Castle Festival. It is being organized by Tribus Musicae in cooperation with the Archdiocese of Bratislava, the Bratislava regional authority, and the Bratislava Cultural and Information Center. A detailed program can be found on www.tribusmusicae.sk.

The organ at St. Martin's Cathedral ranks among the largest an most innovative organs in central Europe. It was installed in 2004.

Alternative currency to buoy local businesses launches in Kosice

A project that seeks to buoy local primary producers and traders and involves the use of an alternative currency known as 'ducat' has been launched in Kosice, TASR learned on August 10.

The project is an initiative of a civil association called 'Kosice Ducat to Exchange Goods and Services,' which also provides its members with the alternative coins.

"The point is to bring together people from the Kosice region, but not only them; it can be used by people from all over Slovakia who are ready to exchange goods or services for Kosice ducates," said the association's head Vladimir Gurtler.

A total of 5,000 coins worth one ducat - once a major currency throughout much of Cental Europe - have to date been minted with each of them equalling one euro. The coin has been designed by medalist Branislav Ronai and its front face features a detailed coat of arms of Kosice and the nominal value, and the back face has Kosice's St. Elizabeth Cathedral and a detailed view of its gothic-era window.

A possible further round of minting will hinge on how the project catches on. "There's a bit of a risk in that the coin is so beautiful that people may not even exchange it for products or services," said Gurtler.

A wine shop, a cabinet maker, an electrician and an English teacher, for example, have signed up to the project so far.

Bratislava and Zvolen have had their local currency - called 'zivec' in both cases - since April 2014, with up to 40 businesses accepting the currency in the capital alone.

Our former Supreme Ladies Vice President

Anne Z. Sarosy, dedicated Slovak cultural, fraternal activist, laid to rest

Anne Dolores Zvara Sarosy, a long-time resident of Campbell, Oh. and resident of Colorado Springs, Colo. for the last nine



years, passed away peacefully on August 4. She was 92. Anne served as Supreme Ladies Vice Presi-

dent of the Slovak Catholic Sokol from 1980 to 1988.

A native of Campbell, Oh., Anne was born there July 14, 1923, daughter of Slovak immigrant parents, Joseph Zvara and the former Dorothy Sarvas. She was educated locally and was a graduate of Campbell Memorial High School. She was awarded her undergraduate degree in Education, cum laude, from Youngstown State University and was awarded a M.A. in Education/Counseling at Westminster College in New Wilmington, Pa. She received certification as a school counselor in the state of Ohio. In addition, she pursued Slovak language studies at the University of Akron, the University of Pittsburgh and the Slovak Jesuit Institute in Toronto, Canada.

Anne was an accomplished accordionist, having her own orchestra heard weekly on WKBN Radio in the late 1930s and early 1940s. It was here she met her future husband, John Sarosy, the vocalist. They was married on May 10, 1941 and spent the summer in New York City, where John studied voice at the Metropolitan Opera. World War II changed the direction of their lives. While John was serving his country with the famed Jolly Rogers-Army Air Corps in the South Pacific. Anne worked as an apprentice draftsman for Republic Steel in Youngstown, Oh., and studied Machine Drawing/Engineering at Case School of Applied Science in Cleveland.

Enriching young minds was always in the forefront for Anne. She was a dedicated teacher who set high goals and expectations for each of her many students during her 32 years with the parochial and public schools in Campbell, Oh. She was instrumental in early childhood development programs in the area, having worked with Head Start.

Anne was extremely proud of her Slovak heritage and became an active Sokolka in her youth. She served as an officer and as president of our former Assembly 26 in Campbell. In 1978, Anne was the first female elected as president of Group 17, "Rev. Francis Skutil" serving in this position for a number of years. The 23rd national convention elected Anne as Supreme Ladies Vice President

in 1979. She was reelected to this position at the 24th convention in 1983 serving in this position for a total of eight years. She served on the committee for our organization's 75th anniversary in 1980 and created and hand-stitched the beautiful Diamond Jubilee Quilt which incorporated individual colorful patches submitted by the organization's Assemblies and Wreaths. This creative "labor of love" as she noted at its unveiling, continues to grace our Slovak Catholic Sokol Museum at the home office in Passaic. During her years as Supreme Ladies Vice President, Anne penned the popular column "Stir Craft'n Stitch in the Slovak Catholic Falcon. In 1995, in recognition of her years of dedicated fraternal service and leadership, Anne was named the Slovak Catholic Sokol Fraternalist of the Year.

She and her husband, John Sarosy, who served as a Supreme Auditor of the Slovak Catholic Sokol, were active in St. John the Baptist Slovak Parish in Campbell, Oh. In addition to our organization, Anne was a founding director of the Mahoning Valley Slovak Cultural Society. During the American Bicentenial in 1976, she help organize one of the largest Slovak American celebrations. Anne was also active in the work of the Slovak League of America. She served as a national vice president and was director of its scholarship awards program for many years. She was among the early supporters of the work of the Slovak World Congress which was established in 1970. She served as chairperson of its women's committee. She participated as a delegate to the Conference on Freedom and Peace hosted by the Slovak World Congress in November 1983 in Munich, then still part of West Germany. She also participated in the Youth Festivals of the Slovak World Congress in Austria and the United States. In 1995, Anne edited the Cookbook "A Culinary Collection of our Slovak Heritage published by the Slovak World Congress. In addition, she co-authored with her daughter, Sandra Sarosy Duve, the Slovak cookbook, Treasured Tastes and Traditions.

Anne visited Slovakia on two occasions. In addition, Anne was active in the work of the Slovak Catholic Federation and was a member of the First Catholic Slovak Ladies Association.

She is survived by her daughters, Sandra Duve(James) of Colrado Sprigns, Co. and Martha Vercellone(Joseph) of Dothan, Ala; granddaughter Julianne Gnandt(Dr. Ryan); grandsons, Christopher Duve(Laura) and Jonathan Zetts; and great-grandchildren, Madeline and James Duve and Matthew, Andrew, Nicholas and Jonathan

Po desiatich rokoch sa minulý rok skončila v Afganistane bojová operácia ISAF a jej prirodzeným pokračovaním sa od januára stala nebojová misia Resolute Support.

Jej primárnym cieľom je podpora, ale aj poradenstvo a výcvik afganských bezpečnostných síl. V Afganistane má Slovensko v súčasnosti nasadených 51 vojakov.

Ich jadro tvoria členovia 5. pluku špeciálneho určenia - út-

varu síl pre špeciálne operácie. Okrem vojakov školiacich afganských kolegov pôsobia priamo v Kábule slovenskí vojaci v najvyššom veliteľstve Resolute Support a dvaja zdravotníci v poľných nemocniciach.

V štruktúre najvyššieho veliteľstva špeciálnych síl v Afganistane NSOCC-A reprezentuje Slovenskú republiku jeden člen 5. pluku špeciálneho určenia...

Slovenskí vojaci by mali v Afganistane v budúcnosti školiť aj letecký a technický personál Afganskej národnej armády. Na základe požiadaviek partnerov Slovensko už pripravuje takýchto odborníkov.

Vládou a parlamentom odsúhlasený počet vojakov pôsobiacich v tejto krajine sa tým nezvýši, potrebné bude odobriť doplnenie úloh. V Afganistane môže pôsobiť podľa schváleného mandátu do 66 slovenských vojakov. - sita

Rozšírenie automobilového priemyslu na Slovensku by malo pozitívne ovplyvniť okrem znižovania nezamestnanosti, ktorá by tak podľa odhadov mohla klesnúť až pod desať percent, aj rast ekonomiky. Investícia v hodnote 1,4 mld. eur predstavuje podľa analytičky Slovenskej sporiteľne Kataríny Muchovej pritom dve percentá hrubého domáceho produktu.

"Výroba dopravných prostriedkov spolu so subdodávateľmi patria k hlavným tahúňom slovenského priemyslu a predstavujú približne tretinu celkovej priemyselnej výroby. Vývoz dopravných prostriedkov je výz-namnou časťou celkového vývozu Slovenska. Automobilová výroba predstavuje zhruba 35 % celkového priemyselného vývozu krajiny. Po spustení produkcie Jaguaru Land Rover by sa tento pomer mal ešte zvýšiť, povedala Muchová.

Vlani sa na Slovensku vyrobilo viac ako 970-tisíc nových automobilov. Po prepočte na tisíc obyvateľov sa v krajine pod Tatrami vyrobí najviac automobilov na svete, konkrétne 179. Automobilová výroba predstavuje zhruba 35 % celkového priemyselného vývozu krajiny.

Automobilky s dodávateľmi dávajú prácu pre vyše 70-tisíc Slovákov. Nepriamo aj s nadviazanými odvetviami služieb a priemyslu výroba áut zamestnáva až 200-tisíc Slovákov.

Naposledy v roku 2006 začali na Slovensku výrobu trnavská automobilka PSA Peugeot Citroën a žilinská Kia. Jaguar Land Rover je tak investíciou desaťročia. Predtým, ešte v roku 1991, prišiel do Bratislavy nemecký Volkswagen.

Bojnický zámok patrí medzi najkrajšie zámky v strednej Európe





Bojnický zámok patrí medzi najkrajšie a najnavštevovanejšie zámky nielen na Slovensku, ale aj v strednej Európe. Romantickú stavbu prestavali v rokoch 1889 – 1910 podľa projektu architekta Jozefa Huberta na spôsob francúzskych gotických hradov, s čiastočným ponechaním pôvodného stavu niekdajšieho stredovekého hradu.

Príkaz na prestavbu mu dal gróf Ján František Pálffy, posledný šľachtický majiteľ zámku. Očaril ho vzhľad zámkov pri rieke Loire v strednom Francúzsku, preto sa rozhodol dať zámku novú neogotickú tvár s výraznými strmými strechami paláca, kaplnky a veží

Práve Ján Pálffy vo svojom testamente vyslovil želanie, aby umelecké diela zostali na svojich miestach a prehliadku priestorov zámku umožnili všetkým záujemcom. Časť cenných predmetov síce rozpredali, no múzeum pod správou Slovenského národného múzea sa môže pýšiť niekoľkými historickými skvostmi. K najväčším unikátom a najcennejším dielam patrí neskorogotický súbor obrazov - tzv. Bojnický oltár od florentského majstra Narda di Cione Ortagna z polovice 14. storočia.

O koľko zarábajú na Slovensku ženy menej ako muži

Na Slovensku zarábajú ženy v priemere o 22 percent menej ako muži. Najväčší rozdiel medzi platmi mužov a žien je v Košickom kraji, kde ženy zarobia až o 24 percent menej. Ich mesačná mzda je až o 240 eur nižšia ako u mužov. Muži v Bratislavskom kraji zarábajú v priemere 1 413 eur mesačne v hrubom. Ženy zarobia o 21 percent menej, teda 1 119 eur. Vyplýva to z prieskumu platov portálu platy.sk.

Najmenší rozdiel medzi platmi žien a mužov je v Prešovskom kraji, kde priemerná hrubá mesačná mzda muža tvorí 877 eur, pričom u žien je to 712 eur. Rozdiel medzi nimi tak celkovo tvorí 165 eur mesačne.

Mesačné platy od roku 2014 sa zvýšili o 4 percentá. Kým minulý rok zarobili Slováci v priemere 890 eur v hrubom za mesiac, tento rok tvorí hrubý mesačný plat 924 eur. A to aj vrátane odmien zamestnancov.

Najvyšší plat dostávajú ľudia pracujúci v Bratislavskom kraji, kde v priemere zarobia 1 280 eur mesačne. Košický kraj tvorí oproti Bratislavskému regiónu najmenší rozdiel 28 percent spomedzi ostatných krajov.

Slovensko získalo štvrtú automobilku. Jaguar Land Rover vytvorí 8-tisíc nových pracovných miest, z toho polovicu priamo v závode pri Nitre a druhú polovicu v sieti subdodávateľov. Výroba luxusných terénnych áut by sa mala začať v roku 2018.

Závod by mal ročne vyrobiť 300-tisíc áut, čím sa stane jednou z najväčších fabrík spoločnosti. Slovenská lokalita by mala byť zároveň prvou na území Európskej únie mimo Veľkej Británie.

Napriek podpisu memoranda s vládou SR definitívne rozhodnutie automobilky ešte nepadlo. To by malo byť známe až po výsledkoch štúdie uskutočniteľnosti neskôr v tom-

to roku. Poliaci nedávno informovali, že Jaguar príde k nim a v utorok v krajine zavládlo rozčarovanie. Predstavitelia poľskej vlády tvrdia, že rozhodli stimuly, ale samotná automobilka hovorí niečo iné.

"Rozhodli sme sa vstúpiť do štúdie uskutočniteľnosti so Slovenskom, pretože je sídlom automobilového priemyslu, má prístup k silným dodávateľským reťazcom a k dobrej logistickej infraštruktúre," reagovala pre denník Pravda Lisa Palmerová, hovorkyňa automobilky Jaguar Land Rover. Nová továreň tak má doplniť existujúce fabriky vo Veľkej Británii, v Číne, Indii a ro-

Svetová výstava Titanic v Bratislave

V stredu 12. augusta v Bratislave slávnostne otvorii výstavu pod názvom Titanic. Vďaka dokonalej rekonštrukcii kajút na lodi, strojovne alebo jedálne návštevníkom vzniká naozajstná atmosféra prepychu aj biedy na začiatku 20. storočia. Návštevnící zažijú nádheru dobových interiérov, ale aj hluk strojovní a následnú úzkosť pred naozajstným a reálnym nešťastím.

Expozícia je rozšírená o tzv. Slovenskú stopu na Titanicu. Organizátori sa pre ňu rozhodli po zistení, že medzi pasažiermi legendárnej lode bol aj Slovák. Výstavu doplnili o ilustračné zábery a udalosti zo Slovenska v čase potopenia slávnej lode z archívu Slovenského národného múzea.

Výstava prezentuje stovky originálnych artefaktov, ktoré boli zachránené zo slávneho vraku Titanic. Medzi exponátmi sú časti vybavenia lode, rôzne kusy nábytku, porcelán a osobné predmety cestujúcich (šperky, kabelky, či časti oblečenia).
