In 1970, he returned to serve as our organization's underwriter, remaining until his retirement in 1981. Since then, he served as the national secretary of the Slovak League of America, retiring in 2008. He continues to do archival work in the office of the Slovak League which is located in our headquarters building. He currently comes to the home office on the average of three days a week filled with determination, energy and enthusiasm of an individual many years younger. Brother John became our Sokol members more than 65 years ago. He served for many years as the financial secretary of our former Assembly 282 in Passaic, representing this lodge at numerous Sokol conventions. He currently serves as the Honorary Vice President of Assembly 182 in New York City at St. John Nepomucene Parish where he and his wife of 55 years, Nina have been active for many years. Thoughts from our Supreme Chaplain

Questions And Answers to clarify why we do what we do as Roman Catholics during Lent by Rev. Andrew S. Hvozdovic

Q. Why do we say that there are forty days of Lent? When you count all the days from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, there are 46.

A. It might be more accurate to say that there is the "forty day fast within Lent." Historically, Lent has varied from a week to three weeks to the present configuration of 46 days. The forty day fast, however, has been more stable. The Sundays

of Lent are certainly part of the Time of Lent, but they are not prescribed days of fast and abstinence.

Q. So does that mean that when we give something up for Lent, such as candy, we can have it on Sundays?

A. Apart from the prescribed days of fast and abstinence on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, and the days of abstinence every Friday of Lent, Catholics have traditionally



chosen additional penitential practices for the whole Time of Lent. These practices are disciplinary in nature and often more effective if they are continuous, i.e., kept on Sundays as well. That being said, such practices are not regulated by the Church, but by individual conscience.

Q. I understand that all the Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat, but I'm not sure what is classified as meat. Does meat include chicken and dairy products?

A. Abstinence laws consider that meat comes only from animals such as chickens, cows, sheep or pigs , all of which live on



land. Birds are also considered meat. Abstinence does not include meat juices and liquid foods made from meat. Thus, such foods as chicken broth, consomme, soups cooked or flavored with meat, meat gravies or sauces, as well as seasonings or condiments made from animal fat are technically not forbidden. However, moral theologians have traditionally taught that we should abstain from all animal

derived products (except foods such as gelatin, butter, cheese and eggs, which do not have any meat taste). Fish are a different category of animal. Salt and freshwater species of fish, amphibians, reptiles, (cold-blooded animals) and shellfish are permitted.

Q. I've noticed that restaurants and grocery stores advertise specials on expensive types of fish and seafood on Fridays during Lent. Some of my Catholic friends take advantage of these deals, but somehow I don't feel right treating myself to the lobster special on Fridays during Lent.

A. While fish, lobster and other shellfish are not considered meat and can be consumed on days of abstinence, indulging in the lavish buffet at your favorite seafood place sort of misses the point. Abstaining from meat and other indulgences during Lent is a penitential practice. On the Fridays of Lent, we remember the sacrifice of Christ on Good Friday and unite ourselves with that sacrifice through abstinence and prayer.

Q. I understand that Catholics ages 18 to 59 should fast on Ash Wednesday and on Good Friday, but what exactly are the rules for these fasts?

A. Fasting on these days means we can have only one full, meatless meal. Some food can be taken at the other regular meal times if necessary, but combined they should be less than a full meal. Liquids are allowed at any time, but no solid food should be consumed between meals.

Q. Are there exemptions other than for age from the requirement to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday?

A. Those that are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill including individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.









Slovak Independence Program on March 12 in New York City

On Sunday, March 12, Assembly 1 of the Slovak League of America in cooperation with Assembly 182 of the Slovak Catholic Sokol, Branches 45 and 716 of the First Catholic Slovak Union and Branch 2 of the First Catholic Slovak Ladies Association, will host the traditional Slovak Independence Program at the United Parish of St. John Nepomucene, St. John Martyr and St. Frances Cabrini. The program begins with Mass celebrated at 10:30 a.m. in the church located at the corner of First Avenue and East 66th Street. The independence day program will begin in the social hall located at 406 East 67th Street at 1 p.m.

The observance celebrates the 24th anniversary of the independence of the present Slovak Republic. It also recalls the March 14, 1939 declaration of the Slovak autonomist parliament. While the first republic was unfortunately associated with Germany, nevertheless it was officially recognized by a total of 28 other states including the Holy See. At the conclusion of World War II, Slovakia was again incorporated into Czechoslovakia, against the will of the majority of the Slovak people. With advent of Communism in 1948, the question of Slovak independence had to wait until it fall in 1989 and then during the summer of 1992, the Slovaks and Czechs agreed to peacefully separate in what has been referred to as "the Velvet Revolution" which led to the "Velvet Divorce." Then on January 1, 1993, Slovakia and the Czech declared their independence.

The guest speaker at this year's Slovak independence observance will be Dr. Mikulas Halko of Mt. Kisco, N.Y. Dr. Halko, who is our Sokol member, serves as the National First Vice President of the Slovak League of America is a respected Slovak author and cultural leader. Serving as the master of ceremonies will be Dr. Larry Korcek, president of Assembly 182 of the Slovak Catholic Sokol. The program will include a musical interlude. A luncheon featuring Slovak culinary specialities will be served. Area Sokols and Sokolky are invited to participate in this cultural afternoon.


12th Annual Consular Tour to Slovakia set for July 29-Aug. 11

The tour includes history-rich cities including the nation's capital, Bratislava, the Marian Shrine at Sastin, Skalica, Trencin, Bojnice, Rajecke Teplice, Cicmany, the High Tatras, the Marian Shrine at Levoca, Kezmarok, Zdiar, Stara Lubovna, Kosice, Badejov, Jedlinka and Presov. Volleyball Rules and Regulations for upcoming 2017 International Slet

The last two International Slets have included the return of Volleyball in a Co-Ed format. It really was a hit both years, especially last Slet when it came down to the final match. We had a total of 7 Groups participate in Volleyball last Slet and we are hoping to have a large turnout again. After modifying the point system we found it to be successful in speeding up the tournament time while keeping it full of energy and excitement.

Below are the rules for the tournament and follow the Current National Federation(High School Rules), which govern play.

Below is the list of the key rules to note

1. There are a maximum of 6 players on court at one time(three men and three women).

2. A team may play with no fewer than 5 players.

3. If a team plays with 5 players then 3 of those 5 must be female.

4. Net Height is 8 feet.

5. If a team is not there at game time, the first game of the set will be forfeited. After twenty minutes the entire match will be forfeited.

6. Substitutions may be made anytime the ball is not in play, but must stay in rotation.

7. There will be allowed 2 timeouts per game for 30 seconds.

8. Any unsportsmanlike conduct will result in a loss of a point and side out for the first offense. The second offense will result in removal of that game.

9. Ball may hit net on serve and is live ball if goes over to other side. 10. Teams change courts and

serve at end of each game. 11. A girl must hit the ball at least

once before it goes over the net unless there are less than 3 total hits.

12. A player may not attack or block the ball directly off the serve. 13. A player rotating off the front

row must wait three rotations before returning to the front row. 14. If a bad pass is out of bounds and goes forward beyond the poles

on the side lines, it cannot be put back into play. It will be called out of bounds

15. Scoring will be rally scoring the best out of 3 games. The first 2 games will play to 15 win by 2 and if needed a third game will be a first to 10 sudden death which means you do not have to win by 2. First to 10 wins. In the Championship game, it will be 3 games if needed. All championship games must be won by 2 points. The first 2 games will be played to 25 rally scoring and the final to 15 win by 2.

16. When we set up the brackets, the previous year Champions and Runner's up will be seeded at opposite ends of brackets. If there is an odd number of teams and we need to give a team a bye, it will be given to the last Slet Champion. If they do not have a team, than it will be given to the Runner up.

17. Depending on the amount of teams we have, will determine weather we decide to play round robin, double elimination or single elimination. Determined by the fitness board at Slet.

The tournament has been received well and at times gets a little intense, but as I have stated before we want to maintain an atmosphere that is good-natured at all times, promotes fraternalism and sets a good example for the upcoming vouth

Fašiangy in Slovakia

Carnival, called Fašiangy in Slovakia, is the time between Epiphany and the movable Tuesday before Ash Wednesday.

The roots of this tradition go back to Slavonic pagan predecessors of today's Slovaks. In villages, Fašiangy was marked by processions with masks or "carolers" walking around local houses, while in larger towns, this time of year meant balls and dance events.

The end of Fašiangy depends on the date of Easter – a movable feast depending on the first full moon after the beginning of astronomical spring, falling on any Sunday between the end of March to the end of April. This year Easter is on April 16.

The word Fašiangy comes from the old Germanic word 'vastschanc', meaning "Ausschank des Fastentrunks", or pouring of the fasting drink. Pouring the fasting drink symbolized the beginning of the 40 days of fasting during Lent, the time preceding Easter. This fasting was very strictly observed in the past, and so the last days of Fašiangy - in some places called "ostatky" (the remaining, last days), were a time of exuberant entertainment. From the era of Great Moravia (9th-10th century), it was also called "mjasopust", meaning letting go of a lot of meat.

Depending on the year, Fašiangy can be short or long. People joked that during a short Carnival, even ugly girls were able to marry, which is connected to the predominate farming culture. Although farmers

were in this period already preparing for spring chores, there was still not much to do, and as the processing of feathers and spinning were usually done, this was an ideal time for weddings. Then, weddings lasted for days and were a feast not just for family, but for the whole village. If a young man failed to marry during this brief period of time, he often had to wait a whole long year.

In a pre-Christian context and in the area of central Europe, Fašiangy was rather aimed at inviting spring with various magic rituals.

Slavs, in those pagan and early-Christian times, used to celebrate this period also as "maslenice" (maslo means butter) which suggests that many substantial meals, rich in calories, were eaten. Slovaks ancestors ate modest meals but during Fašiangy, before fasting, they ate plenty of rich food. Traditional dishes were fánky (sweet squares filled with curd, jam, or walnuts), šišky (filled doughnuts), pampúchy (fried cakes), záviny (strudels) and various delicacies - products of pig-killing which usually also took place at this time of year.

After the introduction of Christianity, Fašiangy got a facelift; with rounds of masked villagers remaining as the only fragment. Masks are now mostly for fun, but in the past masks had a ritual meaning: those used for Carnival mostly represented animals and looked ghostly - Turon (a bovine-like personage), bear or wolf-the more frightening, the better. Their role was to deter demons and evil ghosts.

In the first half of the 20th century, the dressing up started including a soldier with a sable, on which farmers' wives skewered donated meals. Each village had its own traditional well-wishing poems and masks inviting the inhabitants in each yard to dance. There was a local entertainer in each procession who managed it. Fašiangy culminated at a joint village event in a local pub where a feast was organised from the collected meals, with a hoedown. The "burial of the double bass", involving people dressed as priest, organ-player, gravedigger, the instrument on a hearse and granny-weepers, symbolised that the merry time was over and in order to become more introspective for Lent.

Currently, these traditions are being revived around Slovakia, more in the countryside than in cities (where balls have been preserved as a tradition, though). From villages, towns and cities in western Slovakia, through north and south all the way to the very east, the end of Fašiangy was marked by traditional processions, pig-killings and feasts, with some being more of a masked Carnival (e.g. on ice, in Prešov), and some of the traditional procession with re-enactment of old habits (in Chtelnica, Poprad, Prešov, Rimavská Sobota and elsewhere). In still others, like ski resort Plejsy-Krompach and Levoca, there were cooking contests of traditional Fašiangy cakes called pankušky.

In the past, traditions of folk celebrations of Fašiangy virtually perished in the regions of Gemer and Malohont in south-eastern Slovakia, according to Stanislava Zvarová, a folklore specialist of the Gemer-Malohont Educational and Cultural Centre in Rimavská Sobota. However, folklore ensembles have still preserved them and currently they are even being revived again in villages and becoming more popular. "Fašiangy was more generally the time of fun and relaxation, as people still had some supplies of food, and a time of merriment and joy, Zvarová said. "Moreover, masks helped hide people's identity, so even those who tended to be more serious during the rest of the year let it all hang out, sang and danced."

Restoration of Zobor monastery ruins to advance this year



The Zobor Beautification Fellowship, armed with a subsidy of \$8,000 from the Nitra city council, is planning to make progress in reconstructing the ruins of the first monastery on the territory of present-day Slovakia, which is located on Zobor hill near Nitra, and to make the monastery's church accessible to the public this year, fellowship head Jan Kratochvil has told TASR

"We managed to finish the work on the construction details concerning the ruins of the monastery's Church of St. Joseph in 2016. Parts of the ruins above ground have been preserved. We plan to place an altar table and a statue of St. Andrew Svorad who resided in the monastery, in April 2017. The premises will than be made accessible to the public," said Kratochvil.

The Zobor Beautification Fellowship has been active in striving to restore the monastery for years. It has been decided that the restoration would be completed in six stages concluding in 2024. Cost of the project will be more than \$1 million.

There is historical evidence of the existence of the Benedictine monastery of St. Hippolytus on Zobor hill dating back to the year 880 A.D. and the site is also known as the place of origin of the oldest written documents in Slovakia - the Acts of Zobor(1111-1113).

Zobor Abbey served as a key center of the spiritual, legal and cultural life in the early Kingdom of Hungary until it was transferred with all its property to the Nitra diocese by the Pope in 1468.

The monastery was then deserted for 150 years until the arrival of Camaldolese monks who built the church dedicated to St. Joseph in the late 17th century. The most notable figures of this era included the legendary 'Flying Monk' Cyprian, who allegedly constructed mechanical wings that he actually used for flying, and Friar Romuald Hadbavny, a distinguished linguist, who was the first person to translate the bible into Slovak almost three centuries ago, even before the language was first codified by Anton Bernolak in 1787

In the early 11th century, the hermit, St. Andrew Svorad entered the monastery of St. Hippoltus on mount Zobor. St. Andrew Svorad is the patron of the Benedictine Abbey in Cleveland founded by Slovak Benedictines in 1922.

Be Winter Wise: Exercise

Hibernation is for bears. It can be heart hazard for humans.

cholesterol, which are risk factors for heart disease.

These are some of the reasons why the American Heart Association suggests you exercise aerobically at least 30 to 60 minutes three times a week. Your workout should be at moderate intensity over a continuous period, though levels vary according to condition and health.

Indoors or outdoors, cold or hot, don't forget these American Heart Association tips:

* Work out only when you feel well

* Wait at least two hours after eating before exercising hard.

* Adjust to the weather. Summer can cause you to overheat, while strong winds, snow, freezing rain and cold temperatures can take away your body's heat.

* Slow down for hills to avoid working too hard.

* Be aware of symptoms such as discomfort in the upper body, bones and joints, fainting, and shortness of breath while exercising.

* Watch for signs of overdoing it such as inability to finish, nausea, or trouble sleeping.

* Start slowly and progress gradually

Fico: election of Donald Trump great chance for Europe

The election of Donald Trump as president of the United States poses a significant opportunity for bolstering the global standing of the EU, said Slovak Prime Minister Robert Fico on February 2 on his way to an informal summit EU leaders held in Malta's capital of Valletta.

"We're making a great mistake if we don't view the change in the office of president of the United States as an opportunity," said Fico.

"I think that it should lead us to greater sovereignty of opinions and considerations of how to reinforce Europe in terms of security but also to more courageous opinions on certain problems such as Syria, sanctions against Russia and the like. I hope that this will also be part of the discussions at the summit, said Fico.

Fico doesn't mind the fact that Trump is surrounded by Eurosceptics. "If this is so, let Europe say that it needs to be more courageous in articulating its opinions. We need to say to ourselves what we want and don't want. Let's not wait for what our American big brother tells us as usual. We've been in that place in the case of sanctions against Russia. I believe that Europe should have its own opinion, should speak its own mind and shouldn't be on some bandwagon of the United States," he stressed.

Therefore, Fico perceives the election of Donald Trump as an opportunity for the EU to show that it's a strong union. "Let's change the world a little as well, not just keep looking towards East and West."

The prime minister is convinced that it should be clearly stated at the summit that pursuing regime change in third countries through the use of force and without alternative solutions is dangerous. He cited Libya as an example, as 181,000 migrants have come to Europe from that country in the past year alone. "If Libya were a country today where any sort of regime existed - any kind of order - then it certainly wouldn't have been a staging area for hundreds of thousands of migrants today. So, it's good that we'll also be talking at the summit about how to aid Libya in terms of stabilizing its domestic life," he said.

Fico pointed out that Libya isn't as stable a country as Turkey, which struck a deal with the EU to stop the flow of migrants to Europe. The premier sees a solution in protecting the Schengen borders. "Some gentlemen in western Europe should have given more thought before they started to bombard Libya as to whether they also had a Plan B up their sleeves, but apparently they didn't have one. Now, all of them are whining and shouting that 181,000 migrants came from Libya in 2016, but that's not my responsibility - that's the responsibility of those who bombarded the regime in Libya out of existence," he said.

The prime minister also pointed out that former Libyan dictator Muammar Gaddafi warned that Europe would "turn black" without cooperation. "Instead of cooperating with Gaddafi, we murdered him," he added.

Therefore, Fico welcomes Donald Trump's new strategy of not using force against foreign regimes without planning ahead for the future. "Crying over spilled milk in Libya today is completely ridiculous. If the countries that bear the largest responsibility for the situation in Libya attempt to lecture us on migration tomorrow, then they'll hear the Visegrad Four countries(Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland and Slovakia) speak their minds at a minimum," he stressed.

The EU leaders in the Malta Declaration approved the allocation of \$220 million for cooperation with Libya on February 3. "It is the EU that is responsible for the state of this country today to a large degree. Nowadays, it serves as the staging area for migrants, who are completely openly referred to by the European Council as economic migrants, said Fico.

SBA: Slovak banking sector's profit up year-on-year in 2016

Slovakia's banking sector posted a profit of \$800 million at the end of 2016, up by 23.8 percent, year-on-year, according to preliminary data released by the central bank(NBS) on February 6.

Meanwhile, the Slovak Banking Association (SBA) noted that a significantly positive effect for the profitability of the sector last year was provided by Visa Inc's acquisition of Visa Europe. "One-shot dividend incomes and financial operation yields also had positive effects on profitability last year," stated SBA, adding that these items increased the sector's yields by \$250 million, boosting the overall economic result by around 25 percent.

Conversely, net interest incomes fell by \$4.6 percent year-on-year due to low interest rates, while net fee and commission incomes were also down on an annual basis.

The sector's overall balance increased by 5.9 percent, year-on-year. The state of loans provided to the public rose by 13.4 percent, with corporate loans being up by 5.3 percent.

"The highest number of new and refunding housing loans ever was provided last year, an increase of more than 50 percent compared to 2015," SBA pointed out. Meanwhile, the interest rates for these loans were down to 1.86 percent on average, while the share of defaults was also down, to 4.54 percent.

Industrial output up 3 percent, year-on-year in December 2016

Slovakia's industrial output went up by 3 percent, yearon-year in December 2016, the Slovak Statistics Office announced on February 10.

This development was influenced by hikes in electricity, gas, steam and air-conditioning supplies of 1.4 percent; in mining and quarrying of 7.7 percent; and in manufacturing of 1.6 percent.

Total industrial production was effected by year-on-year growth in the following sectors: in the manufacture of transport vehicles - 4.4 percent; in the production of metals and metal structures excluding machinery and equipment - 8.5 percent; in the production of foodstuffs, beverages and tobacco products - 9.7 percent; and in the production of wooden and paper products and printing - 4.4 percent.

Seasonally adjusted industrial output mounted by 0.4 percent month-on-month in December.

Twelve months into 2016, meanwhile, industrial output rose by 3.3 percent year-on-year, with increases in manufacturing of 3.5 percent and in electricity, gas, steam and air conditioning supplies of 2.9 percent. Conversely, output in mining and quarrying saw a decline of 3.1 percent.

Fitch affirms Slovakia's rating at 'A+', with stable outlook

Fitch Ratings has announced that it has affirmed Slova-

kia's Long-Term Foreign and Local Currency Issurer Default Ratings(IDR) at 'A+' with a stable outlook

The agency highlighted Slovakia's "robust and credible economic framework" including a solid banking sector, the country's eurozone membership and proven ability to attract foreign investment as the main drivers of the developments.

However, Fitch pointed to a relatively higher GDP volatility, which is due to Slovakia's concentration in the car industry(44 percent of industrial production and 35 percent of exports in 2016) and high external openness.

At the same time the rating was also inhibited by high net external debt, amounting to 38 percent of GDP in 2016.

Selected stories are provided by TASR-Slovakia, the Slovak Republic's official News Agency.

Nonetheless, recent improvements in the current account should support a decline in net external debt, noted the agency.

Fitch foresees Slovakia's GDP growing at 3.3 percent in 2017 and 3.5 percent in 2018, while the future for 2016 stood at 3.3 percent. Investment should benefit from the recovery in EU-funded drawing, which is expected to equal to \$16.2 billion(20 percent) of GDP in 2015) over the financial period of 2014-2020, and continued foreign investment in the car industry, including a new investment by Jaguar Land Rover also Volkswagen, Peugeot-Citroen and Kia) in Slovakia should reach 150,000 vehicles annually by 2020.

Also, falling unemployment(9.0 percent in November from 10.9 percent a year ago) will support growth in households' consumption, expects Fitch.

Meanwhile, the agency expects the public administration (Continued on page 14)



The large open-air Museum of the Slovak Village is situated on the outskirts of the northcentral city of Martin. The museum was established in the 1960s by the Slovak National Museum in Martin. GROUPS – ASSEMBLIES - WREATHS

Many of our assemblies, wreaths and groups today have their funds in checking accounts, money market accounts, bank certificate of deposit (cd) and/or savings accounts which are currently earning little or no interest. For the past several years and into the near future these financial vehicles have and will continue earn very low interest rates.

Within the last couple of years the Slovak Catholic Sokol (Sokol) created the SOKOL SECURE FUND as a benefit program that offers groups, assemblies, wreaths, churches or associations that are non-for-profit and affiliated with the Slovak Catholic Sokol. The SOKOL SECURE FUND that is combination of a CD, money market fund and saving fund. The major difference that separates our fund from what banks and other financial institutions offer is the flexibility to add funds at any time, withdrawal funds without penalty and earn an outstanding and hard to beat 2.5% APY. In the event that interest rate should rise the SOKOL

SOKOL SECURE FUND - Bank CD:

SECURE FUND can increase per the approval by the Board of Directors, whereas with a Bank CD the interest rate remains the same through the term of the CD contract period.

SOKOL SECURE FUND out performs Bank CD's

Bank CD interest rates obviously range differently between banking institutions and regions of the country. Recent rate numbers in the Pittsburgh region show that a 1-year CD earns .05%, a 2-year earns 1%. To earn an interest rate anywhere near 2% financial institutions will require you to tie your money up for at least 4 years. If an emergency occurs and the need to access these funds prior to the end of your CD term, be prepared to pay an early withdrawal fee. With a Sokol Secure Fund there is not a withdrawal fee. The only requirement is to maintain a balance of \$4,000. Following are two charts that compare the growing power of the SOKOL SECURE FUND as compared to a Bank CD and Money Market Account:

The SOKOL SECURE FUND

This benefit is titled SOKOL SECURE FUND, it is designed specifically for Not-For-Profit Corporations with an Internal Revenue Service designation of 501(c)(3) or 501(c)(8) and cannot be used as an individual account. Currently this benefit is only available to Groups, Assemblies and Wreaths, churches or associations that are non-forprofit and affiliated with the Slovak Catholic Sokol.

How to open a SOKOL SECURE FUND

All that is required is to complete an application (SS0911 Application for Sokol Secure Fund) and a minimum deposit of \$5,000.

Flexibility of Fund

Since this benefit is structured to be flexible, additional deposits can be made at any time providing the minimum deposit is at least \$100. The SOKOL SECURE FUND includes the following features: No Loading Fees, No Withdrawal Penalties, High Liquidity and a Competitive Interest Rate of 2.5% APY. For administrative purposes, fund withdrawals are restricted to no more than four times a year, however, remember there are no penalties on any withdrawal of funds. The minimum amount for a withdrawal is \$250.00. Once the fund is established, a minimum balance of \$4,000 must be maintained





deficit to decline to 1.8 percent of GDP in 2017 and 1.0 percent in 2018 from 2.2 percent in 2016, with two main government's priorities being the construction of a Bratislava motorway bypass and of the aforementioned Jaguar Land Rover plant in Nitra.

According to Fitch, Slovakia's government debt was stabilized in 2016, at 52.5 percent of GDP, and should decline gradually to 44 percent of GDP by 2026.

Banska Stiavnica should form part of UNESCO's Underground Europe Route

Banska Stiavnica is likely to appear on UNESCO's new tourist map devoted to underground world heritage, TASR learned from UNESCO World Heritage Center expert for Sustainable Tourism Peter Debrine on February 8.

Slovakia should thus become a pilot country among the Visegrad Four/ V4 countries(the Czech Republic, Poland, Hungary and Slovakia) to be included in the so-called Underground Europe Route. The Underground World Heritage programs focuses on world heritage sites such as tunnels, caves and mines that are hiding the stories of people who helped to build Europe. "It's not only that these sites are nice, but they are also important for the evolution of humanity in particular," said Debrine, who is currently on a working visit to Slovakia.

The final decision of whether Banska Stiavnica will form part of UNESCO's Underground Europe Route will be made official in March after a planned meeting between Banska Stiavnica mayor Nadezda Babiakova and a UNESCO representative in France.

Meanwhile, Debrine's visit to Slovakia is mainly related to preparing for the Sustainable Tourism conference that's scheduled to take place in Bardejov in eastern Slovakia on May 4-5. The conference is set to focus on implementing the World Heritage and Sustainable Tourism Program in Slovakia. This program is aimed at protecting world heritage sites and improving the country's economic development.

ÚPN zverejnil mená pracovníkov ŠtB v Bratislave

Ústav pamäti národa (ÚPN) zverejnil podrobnú rekonštrukciu personálneho obsadenia a organizačnej štruktúry Správy ŠtB Bratislava, súčasť Krajskej správy ZNB Bratislava, v rokoch 1975 až 1989.

ÚPN doplnil pomocou rekonštrukcie a analýzy personálnych spisov a archívnych dokumentov ďalších 1 055 mien príslušníkov ŠtB. Tí sa podľa ústavu mali podieľať v rokoch 1975–1989 na "boji s vonkajším a vnútorným nepriateľom, ochrane socialistickej ekonomiky", sledovaní a odpočúvaní záujmových osôb, emigračných, nacionalistických a iných protištátnych centier a podobne. Ide o 697 nových mien oproti obdobiu pred rokom 1975.

Dáta sa tak pridali k databázam bývalého Stredoslovenského, Východoslovenského a napokon aj Západoslovenského kraja v rokoch 1966 – 1989. Celkovo ide o 4 135 mien príslušníkov ŠtB.

"Zverejnené informácie môžu slúžiť najmä obyvateľom Západného Slovenska, ktorí sa rozhodli spoznať pravdu o svojej minulosti. Platí, že dôsledky každej pokrivenej spoločnosti znášajú celé generácie. Na strane prenasledovaných sú to pocity životného sklamania a bezmocnosti nad dovolaním sa práva a spravodlivosti. Naopak, na strane ich prenasledovateľov (príslušníkov ŠtB) sa dostavuje pocit bezúhonnosti. Snaha o prekrúcanie faktov, relativizovanie pravdy, alebo pokusy o zneužívanie nových príležitostí. Preto je dobré, že dnes v zmysle zákona o Pamäti národa zverejňujeme ďalšie mená prenasledovateľov, ktorí sa z profesionálneho hľadiska podieľali na utrpení nevinných spoluobčanov," uviedol predseda Správnej rady ÚPN Ondrej Krajňák.





Nové číslo vedeckej ročenky Slováci v zahraničí

Krajanské múzeum Matice slovenskej počas roku 2016 pripravilo ďalší, v poradí 33. ročník vedeckej ročenky Slováci v zahraničí. Na približne 140 stranách zborník prináša výsledky vedeckých výskumov, recenzie, názory a informácie odborníkov zaoberajúcich sa



životom a dielom Slovákov v zahraničí.

Zborník je členených do 4 hlavných kapitol.

Kapitolu Štúdie otvára príspevok Kataríny Mosnákovej-Bagljašovej, ktorá sa zaoberá detským slovenským folklórom z obce Jánošík vo Vojvodine. Štúdia prináša veľmi vzácne výsledky terénneho výskumu doplneného o výpovede informátorov.

Ďalšou v poradí je práca Patrika Šenkára, ktorá sa orientuje na vzájomné politickokultúrno-literárne vzťahy Slovákov a Rumunov v období dualizmu. Autor do tohto kontextu uvádza osobu novinára, "priekopníka priateľstva" – Gustáva Augustínyho a jeho záslužnú sprostredkovateľskú činnosť v dobovom kultúrnom ovzduší.

Kapitolu uzatvára štúdia Alžbety Uhrinovej, ktorá sa zaoberá možnosťami štúdia slovenského jazyka v dnešnom Maďarsku. V úvode ponúka krátke exkurz do dejín národnostného školstva. Pokračuje prehľadom slovenského školského systému v Maďarsku. Zaoberá sa aj atuálnymi problémami školstva a možnými prognózami jeho vývoja.

Kapitolu Pramene a materiály zastrešuje príspevok Jána Jančovica. Autor rieši históriu osídľovania Békešskej Čaby a života Slovákov v nej.

V zborníku nájdeme aj tri recenzné príspevky (kapitola Recenzie). Prvá recenzia Claudeho Baláža hodnotí publikáciu Jeana Philippeho Namota. Autor vyjadruje svoje postoje k obsahu knihy Dejiny české a slovenské emigrace ve Francii (1914 – 1940).

Recenzia autorky Eriky Fajnorovej reflektuje antológiu Patrika Šenkára Slovenská dol-

V Košiciach otvorili výstavu Domov v zámorí - Slováci z východného Slovenska

Odhaduje sa, že v 19. a aj 20. storočí sa zo Slovenska do zahraničia odsťahovali dva až tri milióny Slovákov. Mnohí z nich skončili v USA. Ich osudy dokumentuje výstava Domov v zámorí - Slováci z východného Slovenska, ktorú verejnosti sprístupnila Štátna vedecká knižnica v Košiciach.

Výstava bola verejnosti sprístunoená vďaka Ľubici Poklembovej údaje a rôzne informácie o rodákoch zhromažďovala dlhé obdobie. Na výstave ich prezentovala už pred tromi rokmi, ale pre veľký záujem verejnosti ich rozšírila a prezentuje ich opäť. Sprístupnené budú do 22. marca tohto roku.

"Na prípravu boli použité dokumenty z knižného a časopiseckého fondu Štátnej vedeckej knižnice v Košiciach, vvdané na Slovensku i v USA, ale aj biografické heslá z databázy Regionálnych osobností východného Slovenska. Naše bibliografické oddelenie vytvára túto databázu už od roku 1994. Biografický výskum sa zameriava na Slovákov z východného Slovenska, ktorí našli nový domov v USA, ale ai významných amerických rodákov so slovenskými koreňmi," povedala kurátorka výstavy Daniela Slezáková.

Výstava ponúka verejnosti písomné materiály i fotodokumentáciu približujúcu nielen osudy Slovákov v Amerike, pripomína menovite aj tých, ktorí sa v USA stali významnými a slávnymi. Patrí k nim svetoznámy maliar, grafik a dizajnér Andy Warhol, herci Paul Newman a Angelina

nozemská literatúra (v teórii a praxi). Autorka približuje najmä obsahovú stánku knihy, jej členenie a predmetné zameranie. Ostatnou recenziou je príspevok Ladislava Lenovského. Hodnotí zborník z medzinárodnej vedeckej konferencie venovanej životnému jubileu etnografa Ondreja Krupu s názvom Duchovná a sociálna kultúra menšín v majoritnom prostredí. Približuje, aké príspevky zborník prináša najmä po ich obsahovej stránke. Autor si ponecháva priestor aj na vvjadrenie subjektívnych hodnotení.

Správy a informácie obsahujú príspevok Anny Kováčovej. Opisuje životné osudy hudobného skladateľa, dirigenta a zbormajstra Ondreja Francisciho, ktorý autorka obohacuje Jolie so svojím otcom Jonom Voightom.

Výstava pripomína tiež ďalšieho veľmi známeho Slováka. Bol ním Michael Strank, ktorý sa narodil v Jarabine v okrese Stará Ľubovňa. Jeho rodina sa v roku 1919 spolu s jednou ďalšou z Jarabiny odsťahovala do Ameriky. Michael bol počas druhej svetovej vojny seržantom armády USÁ a je považovaný za vojnového hrdinu. Zúčastnil sa na bitke proti Japoncom na ostrove Iwo Jima a bol to práve on, kto vztyčoval po víťazstve nad Japoncami vlaiku USA. Tento moment zachytil fotograf Joe Rosenthal a fotka sa stala predlohou známeho pamätníka Marine Coprs War Memorial, ktorý je najväčším bronzovým súsoším na svete.

Návštevnícá výstavy sa môžu oboznámiť aj s chronologickou dokumentáciou o vysťahovalectve z východného Slovenska do USA.

Masové vysťahovalectvo spadá do obdobia rokov 1867 až 1921, kedy bieda, hlad a zlé sociálne pomery na Slovensku vyháňali Slovákov do zámoria. Prvé kolónie si vytvárali v lokalitách, kde boli bane a železiarsky priemysel," vysvetľuje kurátorka výstavy. Prví Slováci sa sústredili v štátoch New York, New Jersey, Ohio, vo východnej Pensylvánii, v Illinois či Connecticut. V Amerike zakladali krajanské spolky a vytvárali spoločenský život

Spomína sa aj história Slovenskej ligy v Amerike, Pittsburskej dohody a Svetového kongresu Slovákov.

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Ján Holý sa oslávil 95. narodeniny

Dňa 8. februára oslávil významné životné jubileum - 95. narodeny - Ján Holý, dobre známy pracovník v kultúrnom, spolkovom a politickom živote

v USA a v slovenskom exile.

Narodil sa 8 februára 1922 v Novej Bani. Ро ukončení štúdia na gymnáziu Krem-

nici pokračoval na univerzite v Bratislave. V rokoch 1945-1947 bol zamestnaný ako redaktor v Spravodajskej agentúre Slovenska (ZAS). Ód októbra 1947 do januára 1948 bol pre "protištátnu činnosť" väznený a neskôr bol vylúčený zo Zväzu slovenských novinárov. V roku 1948 emigroval do Nemecka a od roku 1949 žije v Spojených štátoch.

Už v utečeneckom tábore v Ludwigsburgu začal svoju exilnú činnosť ako vydavateľ a redaktor Slobodného Slovenska (spolu s Františkom Vnukom). Bol spoluzakladateľom Slovenského sociálneho výboru, prostredníctvom ktorého získaval pomoc pre slovenských utečencov od slovenských organizácií v Amerike.

Do Spojených štátov prišiel v auguste 1949. Hned' po príchode sa stal členom viacerých slovenských organizácií. V roku 1970 sa bol zvolený do Výkonného výboru Slovenskej ligy v Amerike a v r. 1975 po smrti Dr. J. Pauču ho Výkonný výbor Slovenskej ligy vymenoval za generálneho tajomníka. Do tejto funkcie bol viackrát znovuzvolený. V roku 2002 ho Kongres SLvA zvolil za doživotného čestného tajomníka.

Pri zakladaní Svetového kongresu Slovákov bol predsedom prípravného výboru v New Yorku a v prvom predsedníctve SKS zastával funkciu predsedu Organizačnej komisie.

Uznanie si zaslúži aj za záchranu novín Slovák v Ámerike, ktorým v roku 1989 hrozil zánik. Ján Holý sa ujal jeho vydávania a redigovania a v tejto činnosti pokračoval až do konca roku 2008.

Prácu Jána Holého ocenili aj na Slovensku. Za jeho činnosť mu v r. 1975 minister kultúry SR udelil Poctu J. M. Hurbana. V r. 1996 dostal zlatú medailu Matice slovenskej a o rok neskôr, v r. 1997 mu vtedajší prezident SR Michal Kováč udelil štátne vyznamenanie - Rad Ľudovíta Štúra II. triedy. Vysoké ocenenie získal aj v Amerike, keď mu v r. 1998 na návrh komisie, ktorá pozostáva z predsedov americkoslovenských fraternalistických organizáciá, udelili Ellis Island Medal of Honor.

Ján Holý dlhé roky redigoval viaceré slovenské časopisy a niekoľko rokov bol aj redaktorom slovenskej časti týždeníka Slovenský katolícky sokol. Je spoluautorom knihy Slovenská Amerika - Slovak America, a tiež spoluredaktorom s nebohou s. Martinou Tyborovou obsiahlej knihy Slovaks in America (1977), ktorá je najväčším dosiaľ vydaným dielom o Slovákoch v Amerike. Jeho príspevky možno nájsť aj vo viacerých zborníkoch a v mnohých slovenských časopisoch vo svete i na Slovensku.

Jubilant je ženatý. Jeho manželka Nina Holá je tajomníčkou Slovenskej ligy v Amerike. Vychovali dve dcéry - Luby Mason a Jane Konzelman. Obe sú aktívne v slovenskom živote. Majú tiež troch vnukov, jednu vnučku a jednu pravučku.

Ján Holý bol dlhoročným členom a tajomníkom 282. zboru Slovenského katolíckeho sokola v Passaicu, NJ a je čestný podpredseda 182. zboru v New Yorku.

Do ďalších rokov jeho plodného života mu prajeme ešte vel'a síl a zdravia, aby mohol aj naďalej pokračovať v národnej práci.

Krátke správy zo Slovenska

Na Slovensku minulý rok absolvovalo svoju dovolenku rekordne mnoho ľudí. Išlo o viac ako 4,6 milióna ľudí. Medziročne ide o nárast o viac ako 16 percent. Z celkového počtu dovolenkárov na Slovensku svoj oddych absolvovalo naviac ľudí zo Slovenska - približne tri milióny dovolenkárov. Zo zahraničia prišlo najviac hostí z Českej republiky, Španielska, Švajčiarska, Špojeného kráľovstva, USA, Číny alebo Izraela.

Z regiónov návštevníci zavítali najmä do Bratislavského a Žilinského kraja. Najdlhšie sa dovolenkári zdržali v Trenčianskom kraji - približne päť dní. Najviac rástol počet hostí v Košickom kraji, kde sa objem návštevníkov v porovnaní s predchádzajúcim rokom zvýšil o takmer 66 percent.

Tempo rastu nových objednávok v priemysle na Slovensku sa v závere roka zrýchlilo. Ako vyplýva z údajov Štatistického úradu SR, v decembri 2016 dosiahli nové objednávky v priemysle objem 3,749 mld. eur, čo je medziročný nárast o 8.6 %. V novembri nové objednávky rástli 7,5-percentným tempom.

Štvria Slováci z Trebišova boli obvinení s obchodovania s ľuďmi. Boli súčasťou medzinárodného organizovaného gangu, na jeho čele mal byť podľa polície Slovák. Na prípade obchodovania s ľuďmi pracoval spoločný slovenskoanglicko-škótsky vyšetrovací tím. Polícia doposiaľ preukázala, že členovia skupiny zlákali, prepravili a predali najmenej 12 žien z okresu Trebišov. V niektorých prípadoch malo ísť o matky maloletých detí, vydaté ženy a v jednom prípade o tehotnú ženu, ktorá porodila v Škótsku a mala byť donútená do rodného listu uviesť ako otca dieťaťa meno občana Pakistanu. Na území Škótska, Anglicka a Slovenska naďalej prebieha vyšetrovanie a odhaľujú sa ďalšie osoby, ktoré sa mali podieľať na páchaní tejto trestnej činnosti.

Fašiangy končia pred škaredou stredou

Fašiangy (mjasopust) je obdobie od Troch kráľov až do polnoci pred škaredou - Popolcovou stredou. Potom nasleduje 40 dňový pôst (zavedený až koncom 4. storočia kresťanskou cirkvou) až do Veľkého piatku. Je to prechodné obdobie medzi zimou a jarou.

Oslavy fašiangov sa regionálne líšili, aj keď sa vyskytovali aj spoločné črty. Napríklad v regióne Liptov a v obci Čičmany sa varila praženica, na ktorú bola pozvaná celá dedina. Mládenci najprv týždeň pred zábavou chodili po dedine a pozývali dievčatá, ale aj starších. Pri tejto obchôdzke nezabudli zozbierať vajíčka a slaninu. Praženicu väčšinou pripravovala richtárka, potom sa začínala zábava, na ktorej boli aj pražené šišky, karamel, závin, huspenina a ďalšie miestne špeciality. V Honte bolo zvykom robiť pálenku. Chlapci chodili po dedine a vyberali zrno, taktiež spojené s obchôdzkami za dievčatami a pýtaním slaniny, klobásy a niekde im dali aj údené mäso. Všetko sa odnieslo na priadky, kde dievčatá pripravili pohostenie. Fašiangy sa končili v utorok o polnoci.

Fašiangy v meste robili remeselnícke cechy. Teda skôr sa tam konali zábavy, ktorých hlavnými organizátormi boli tovariši. Väčšinou sa konali v dome majstra, pretože tu sa vítali noví tovariši, ktorým bolo poskytnuté krátkodobé ubytovanie. V tomto období sa zvykli stávať z učňov tovariši. Museli

však uspieť v rôznych skúškach. Napríklad v Kežmarku bolo typické kúpanie v studenej a potom teplej vode, nosenie na žrdi atď. Jednotlivé cechy konali sprievody a snažili sa o čo najväčšiu atraktívnosť. Mlynári behali na chodúľoch, debnári krútili nad hlavami obručami a podobne. Remeselnícke fašiangové zvyky zanikli pred 1. svetovou vojnou. Pochovanie basy

Za čias Veľkej Moravy sa na úyemí Slovenska pre obdobie fašiangov používal názov mjasopust alebo masopust, ktorý avizoval blížiaci sa pôst. Dovtedy sa však mohlo na dedinách i v mestách piť, jesť a hodovať do sýta. Toto obdobie hojnosti reprezentoval boh plodnosti Turoň, ktorý ešte i dnes počas fašiangov vídať na niektorých dedinách.

V deň najväčšej fašiangovej zábavy, spravidla posledný deň pred škaredou - Popolcovou stredou, sa i dnes pochováva basa a prichádza 40-dňový pôst, ktorý trvá do Veľkého piatku. Je to prechodné obdobie medzi zimou a iarou.

Koniec fašiangov - pochovávanie basy vychádza z nastávajúceho pôstu, kedy boli zábavy pri muzike zakázané. Na znak toho sa predvádza žartovné pochovávanie hudobného nástroja - basy, pri ktorom vystupovali postavy kňaza, kostolníka i smútiacich pozostalých.Na záver zábavy basu vynesú von zo sály, čím ju symbolicky pochovajú.
