Recalling the legacy of one of Slovakia's most revered sons, General Milan R. Stefanik

On May 4, we commemorated the 98th anniversary of the tragic death of General Milan Rastislav Sefanik, noted Slovak personality and co-founder of the first republic of Czechoslovakia. The son of a Lutheran pastor, he was born on July 21, 1880 in Kosiarisko located in the Trencin region of western Slovakia. In school, he got into difficulty with the Magyar authorities because of his pro-Slovak sentiments. His brilliance in mathematics led to his being sent to the Institute of Technology at Prague. He continued his studies at Charles University where he received his doctorate in 1904. He then pursued the study of astronomy, first at Paris and later at Zurich and Milan. He became a well-known astronomer, educator and world traveler. He was a member of the French Academy as well as the British Royal Society.

A resident of Paris, and a naturalized French citizen, Stefanik entered the French military, rising to the rank of general, following France's entry in World War I in 1914. His winning personality and readiness to assume responsibility gave him the opportunity of doing what he had never dreamed of in his most ambitious plans - that of leading a military movement for the liberation of all the Slav peoples in Austria-Hungary. He recruited three armies, one in France, one in Italy and one in Russia for this purpose.

In June 1917, exactly a century ago, he came to the United States to seek the support of the administration of President Woodrow Wilson and the Slovak League of America which sought the liberation of the Slovaks at home. The United States gave full support to Stefanik and following the U.S. entry into World War I, actively promoted the liberation of the Slovaks and Czechs and the establishment of the first Republic of Czechoslovakia through President Wilson's Fourteen Points in 1918.



He was anxious to get back to the Slovakia he had made free, he planned to make the trip home by plane. After inspecting his army in Milan, Italy on the morning of May 4, 1919, he departed Padua for Bratislava where a huge welcome had been planned. As his Caproni plane appeared over the village of Vajnory, within sight of Bratislava, it was then seen suddenly to burst into flames and crash to the ground. The exact cause of the crash, in which Stefanik and the two Italian officers accompanying him were killed instantly, was never officially determined. Thousands were present to welcome him, including his aged mother

Stefanik's absence in the early years of Czecho-Slovakia led to the internal disagreement about the status of Slovakia in the union of the Slovak and Czech peoples. His input would no doubt have led to a more defined understanding and the establishment of Slovak autonomy, something which had been guaranteed at the creation of the first republic.

General Milan R. Stefanik was truly a renaissance man and one of Slovakia's greatest sons. Let us reverence his legacy and may his memory be eternal!

We Remember Them

With the arrival of Memorial Day, May 29, 2017, it would be well to remember that in this day's observance we are celebrating death...

Of course days set aside to honor the dead are not new to humankind. For example, the Greeks performed Zoai rites at each new grave, the Romans honored their ancestors with a Parentalia festival, and most Oriental peoples took offerings of food to the graves of their ancestors on specified days.

America's Memorial Day began in the aftermath of the Civil War. Families in the South spread flowers on the graves of Confederate and Union soldiers alike. But a day was not set aside officially until General John Logan, Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, issued an order that May 30, 1868 be "for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion and whose bodies lie in almost every city, village, or hamlet churchyard in the land."

Many state legislatures and then the U.S. Congress enacted Memorial Day(originally called Decoration Day) into law.

Let us remember that we do more than celebrate death, for mortals die easily. We honor all the men and women who showed in the most tangible way possible their love and belief in America's democratic ideals and their willingness to die in defense of them. We honor those who died as well as those who lived and still live to carry on.

Whiting, Ind. Slovak church to be shuttered

The Diocese of Gary, Ind. has recently decided to close the Parish of the Immaculate Conception in Whiting, Ind. Serious damage to the structure as a result of recent broken pipes as well as a deminishing number of worshipers has necessitated the decision. The structure, a church-school will soon be raised.

Immaculate Conception Parish has enjoyed a vibrant faith history since its founding in June 1921. The Rev. Michael Kosko was appointed as the first pastor. Land for the new church was purchased for \$25,000 in 1923 from Henry Schrage, Sr. Plans for a church and school combination were made with the idea that later it would be used entirely as a school and a separate church would be constructed. On June 1, 1924 the cornerstone of the structure was blessed. The first liturgy celebrated in the new church by Father Kosko was the Midnight Mass of 1924. With the departure of Father Kosko, the parish welcomed its second pastor, in the person of the Rev. John J. Lach. A native of Hibernia, N.J., he was born there in 1896 of Slovak immigrant parents, Joseph Lach and the former Mary Rakucka. The need for Slovak speaking priests in the Fort Wayne, Ind. diocese, led young John Lach to begin studies for the priesthood at the former St. Procopius Seminary in Lisle, Ill. He was ordained a priest in 1922. Following brief assignments after ordination, in 1926, he was appointed pastor of Immaculate Conception Parish. The completed church and school was solemnly blessed by Bishop John F. Noll in June 1926. Father Lach invited the Sisters of SS. Cyril and Methodius of Danville, Pa. to staff the new school which opened in September 1926. A total of 376 pupils were welcomed in grades 1-8. In 1940, a short-lived junior high school program was inaugurated, affiliated with Catholic Central High School. Its first class of 21 graduated in June 1942. After 59 years of quality Catholic education, Immaculate Conception School closed in 1985.

Knowing the love for music which was inherent in the Slovak people, Father Lach was determined to organize a Slovak Symphonic Band. With much of his time and effort and in spite of the fact that he encountered great difficulties, Father Lach finally organized the band which was a 70-member ensemble. The band traveled extensively throughout the country in the early 1930s. The band promoted the good name of the American Slovak community including a historic concert at the White House for President Herbert Hoover on August 25, 1931. In 1937, Father Lach's

Band left for its history-making European tour. Father Lach and the 70-member Boys Symphonic Band left Whiting, Ind. on June 14 on the first leg of their historic tour. Enroute to New York, the band performed at several Slovak parishes. On June 19, 1937, the group sailed from New York to France on the French liner Ile de France. In Europe, the band performed in concerts in France, Switzerland, Austria, Italy, Germany, Holland, Belgium, Yugoslavia as well as Czechoslovakia. On August 21, 1937, the band arrived back in New York. On their return to Whiting, the band gave concerts in Slovak parishes in New York City, Yonkers and Binghamton, N.Y.; Bridgeport, Conn., Perth Amboy and Trenton, N.J.; Bethlehem and Philadelphia, Pa., Cleveland, Oh., Erie, Pa. and other parishes returning back to Whiting on Sept. 5, 1937. A wonderful new 400-page book on Father Lach's band was recently published by CareyWorks, Inc. Our faithful Whiting Sokolka, Josie Bolek, president of Wreath 81 was kind enough to send a copy of this fascinating book to our home office. We thank her for her kindness.

In 1957, the new Diocese of Gary was established with our own Slovak American Bishop Andrew G. Grutka as its first ordinary. Father Lach and the parish of the Immaculate Conception became part of this new diocese. Father Lach remained an active pastor until his untimely death in May 1960. Bishop Grutka presided over the funeral rites of Father Lach, the first priest of the Gary Diocese to be laid to rest.

In June 1960, the parish welcomed the Rev. Fred Bach as its new pastor. He remained as pastor until his retirement in 1983. From 1983 to 2000, the Rev. Anthony Ficko served as pastor. The Rev. Stanley Dominik succeed him as administrator and the beginning of the merging of Whiting parishes.

Immaculate Conception Parish was a hub of Slovak fraternal activity over the years. Many of the members were active Sokolky in our Wreath 81. Other members belonged to St. John the Baptist Parish, Whiting's second Slovak parish in what was the Robertsdale section of the city. Branches of the First Catholic Slovak Union, the First Catholic Slovak Ladies Association and the Ladies Pennsylvania Slovak Catholic Union were also active. The parish actively supported the work of the Slovak Catholic Federation and generously supported the annual SS. Cyril and Methodius Appeal. The parish was also a strong supporter of the annual Slovak Day observance of the Diocese of Gary.

While we lament the closing of yet another Slovak church, we are sustained in our belief that the Cyrilo-Methodian heritage of faith which was an important part of the fabric of parish life at Immaculate Conception, has been nurtured among generations who today reside through northwest Indiana.

The Sisters of SS. Cyril and Methodius will host their 44th annual Summer Festival on Saturday, July 8 on the spacious grounds of their Motherhouse, Villa Sacred Heart in Danville, Pa. Activities begin at 10:30 a.m. The festival will feature a large Flea Market, a silent auction, home-made baked goods, handcrafted items, a book store and religious and Slovak articles. Despite their own personal challenges, they have attained artistic excellence and reach out to others in need of support. The couple presented an inspiring and entertaining concert. The pastor of the parish, Father Richard D. Baker, himself an accompished musician, was pleased to host the concert and luncheon. Father Baker and Father Martin Kertys who assists at the parish are shown in the top photo with Maros and Alexandra Bango, seated, along with local Slovak Catholic Sokol. Maros Bango, a native of Trnava and his wife, a native of eastern Slovakia are currently on tour in the United Staes with appearances in several Slovak American communities.

Lajcak in Washington: Slovakia remains reliable ally for the USA

Slovakia remains a reliable ally for the United States within NATO and an important partner in the latter's efforts to boost political stability and economic prosperity in Europe, Slovak Foreign and European Affairs Minister Miroslav Lajcak and US Vice President Mike Pence's National Security Advisor Andrea Thompson concurred at a meeting in Washington on May 9.

According to the Slovak Foreign and European Affairs press department, Lajcak confirmed Slovakia's interest in intensifying practical cooperation with the US, noting that Slovakia is a reliable ally for the US not only in Europe, as it has demonstrated by joining the US-led operations in Afghanistan and Iraq.

The Slovak minister also reported on the content of his recent talks with Ukrainian officials in Kiev, presenting the Ukrainian views of how the Minsk Agreements are being implemented and on activities of the Normandy Group.

When it came to the situation in the Western Balkans, Lajcak expressed concerns about recent developments in the region, calling on closer coordination of activities performed by the EU and the USA in the area.

"We're witnessing a weakening of pro-European forces in the Western Balkans. We must step up our influence and engagement. If we don't do it, other players will boost their activities in the area we'll have abandoned, as we've already been witnessing. Meanwhile, it's obvious that there's no better alternative for the region than European prospects," said Lajcak, appreciating Thompson's decision to attend the Globsec international security conference in Bratislava later this month.

At talks with White House senior director for Russia and Europe Fiona Hill, Lajcak discussed mainly Russia and it policies towards neighboring countries, with a special focus on Ukraine. Lajcak pointed out that there's a need to relaunch the Minsk process and look for a political solution to the situation in southeastern Ukraine.

"Despite the existing differences in our and Russia's views of the world, we must keep open communication channels. We've set principles and platform for such communication on NATO soil, but, unfortunately, we're lacking this on the EU soil," added Lajcak.

More than 30,000 locations suffer power blackout due to snow

More than 30,000 locations have experienced power blackouts for more than three minutes in the wake of heavy snowstorms hitting the north of central Slovakia, TASR learned from Gabriel Beer of electricity utility Stredoslovenska Energetika-Distribucia(SEE-D) Zilina's press department on April 18.

By 3 p.m. on April 18, the number of consumers cut off from grid supply had been whittled down to 1,500.

"An hour after midnight, calls reporting power failures started to accumulate, mostly due to trees falling on power lines. The number of consumers who experienced blackouts lasting more than three minutes swelled to more than 30,000 by the morning. We managed to address the bulk of failures by rerouting electricity and supplying consumers via undamaged branches of the distribution grid," said Beer.

Despatched crews managed to restore supplies of electricity across almost the entire affected region, with fewer than 1,500 consumers still cut off at 3 p.m.

Bratislava Council votes down land lease for United States embassy again

Bratislava will not lease an area of 1,300 square feet of the city's land outside the embassy building in the center of Bratislava to the US Embassy to Slovakia, according to a decision made by the Bratislava City Council at a session on April 26.

The area has been used by the embassy since 2005 as a security zone and is enclosed by a security fence, steel posts, barrier flower containers and a retractable car barrier.

Council members had already voted down the request on two other occasions - two months ago and in September 2016.

City Hall was seeking to lease the land to the embassy until August 15, 2019 at a cost of \$500,000 annually. The embassy had a two-year option on renewing the lease contract and was supposed to pay one euro per square metre per day. However, if the embassy could have produced a valid construction permit for a new building, this would have slashed the sum all the way down to 3 euro cents per square metre per day.

Under the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations, a security zone is part of an embassy regardless of its ownership, said City Hall. A land lease contract would provide a legal arrangement vis-a-vis the use of the security zone until the time that the embassy relocates. City coffers could have at least benefited from extra funding until that time, said City Hall.

City Council Member Martin Borgula, who has been a vocal critic of the security fence outside of the embassy, was elated at the council's decision. "We made it clear to the Americans that we don't want a fence on Bratislava's most beautiful square," he said.

Borgula, who believes that the embassy's security could also be ensured even in the absence of a fence, has called for a meeting with the US Embassy with the aim of finding a compromise.

Bratislava deputy mayor Iveta Plsekova weighed in by saying that the council was supposed to decide on a land lease, not the fence as such. "A decision concerning the fence should be made by the Old Town(borough) Construction Office...What we were supposed to do was to decide on leasing the land on which the US Embassy is effectively operating," she said.

Meanwhile, the embassy told TASR in February that it's made progress in its plans to relocate from Hviezdoslav Square and that it's found a suitable site for this purpose. The new facility is supposed to meet all security requirements and to blend in with its surroundings.

Kiska: Slovakia is undiscovered land for Austrians

Slovakia is an undiscovered land for the people of Austria, even though Bratislava and Vienna are situated close to each other, stated Slovak President Andrej Kiska on April 26, with his Austrian counterpart Alexander Van der Bellen, who is paying an official visit to Slovakia, agreeing with this opinion.

"Let's intensify our relationship even more, chiefly in the field of tourism and culture so that Slovaks and Austrians will get to know each other better," said Kiska.

"I must admit that I don't know Slovakia very well, although I've already visited Bratislava a couple of times," said Van der Bellen, adding that he would be glad if Austrians came to Slovakia more often.

Kiska claimed to have many things in common with Van der Bellen in terms of values. "Values such as tolerance, humanity and solidarity are close to me as well," he said. Kiska views this as a weapon against populism, extremism and xenophobia. He thinks that both politicians and ordinary people lack optimism, but he's found it in Van der Bellen. "Optimism needs to be returned to the EU. We must show that we're able to cope with any crisis if we are united," he said. The European Union isn't a problem, but a solution, stated Kiska, stressing the need to hold a dialogue and to be empathic.

"I've found a man who's briefly summed up the essence of the EU," said Van der Bellen in reaction to Kiska's speech. The Austrian president is glad that the opinion that growth in nationalist power can't be halted is no longer as strong among the public. "It's already over," he stated. The results of the Dutch elections attest to this, and Van der Bellen believes that the result of the French elections will do the same.

Van der Bellen confirmed that the two presidents found accord on most issues. However, their opinions on some areas differed, admitted the Austrian president, namely nuclear energy as an example. "We(Austrians) don't see the technology of the future in it," she said.

Kiska reiterated that in the case of a multi-speed EU, Slovakia is interested in being at its core as well, stressed Van der Bellen, who personally doesn't incline towards several speeds, however. "I hope that there won't be any differentiation," he added.

The Austrian president is also scheduled to meet Slovak Prime Minister Robert Fico(Smer-SD), participate in a discussion with students of Comenius University in Bratislava and deliver an address at a Slovak-Austrian economic forum.

Slovakia is the first central and eastern European country that the Austrian president has visited since assuming office.

Austria is one of the biggest investors in Slovakia, with around 2,000 Austrian firms active in the country.

Lajcak: deal on guidelines for Brexit talks in line with Slovak interests

The foreign affairs ministers of 27 member countries of the EU have agreed on a joint approach to guidelines for Brexit talks, and this agreement suits Slovakia's interests well, said Slovak Foreign and European Affairs Minister Miroslav Lajcak after a special meeting of the EU General Affairs Council in Luxembourg on April 27, which was de-

voted to Article 50 of the Treaty of Lisbon.

"The member countries came to an agreement fairly quickly, and all that Slovakia regards as important has been included. Most importantly, this includes the interest of our citizens and also the need for the United Kingdom to observe its financial commitments towards the EU. The supervisory role of member countries was also highlighted," said the Slovak official.

More specifically, Slovakia has two priorities vis-a-vis Brexit - maintaining the current status of the 80,000 Slovak nationals living in the UK and ensuring that the UK delivers on its financial commitments before the end of the present program period; that is, by the end of 2020, said Lajcak.

The unity of the EU27 was the overriding principle in the talks on April 27, "Indeed, the talks today confirmed this unity. We all pledged our unity to last during the Brexit negotiations," said Lajcak.

Even if a possible deal on collaboration between the EU and the UK is hammered out, mutual relations will never

Parks have played an integral role in the lifestyles of Slovaks for centuries. One of the oldest public parks in Europe, the Janko Kral Orchard is located in the northern part of the city of Bratislava - Petrzalka. The park is bordered by the Danube River, the Old Bridge(Stary most), an access road; the New Bridge(Novy most) an access road; and the main road. The Janko Kral Orchard was established in 1774 -1776 to create a public park for the local inhabitants. Since it was under the influence of Baroque classicism, the walks were set up in the shape of an eightpointed star. The park is filled with a variety of trees. Each alley is named for the corresponding species of trees there. The prominent architectural structure of the park is the Gothic tower which dates from the early 15th century. Following extensive damage to the tower after an earthquake in 1897, the tower was rebuilt in the neo-Gothic style. The statue of Janko Kral, a noted Slovak poet 1822-1876, is situated prominently in the heart of the park. The park is a popular destination for locals as well as tourists.

match those seen before Brexit, he noted. Admittedly, the status of Slovak citizens and entrepreneurs in the UK is likely to worsen somewhat, but the EU is committed to minimizing the changes, he added.

The guidelines await approval at an extraordinary summit of the EU27 heads of state or government on May 6. On May 22, the foreign affairs ministers are expected to meet again and okay concrete negotiating principles.

Lajcak believes that the snap election due in the UK in June shouldn't hinder the brexit negotiations.

Fico: good economic results needed to be reflected in living standards

Details concerning more significant growth in the minimum wage and higher bonuses for nighttime and weekend work will be presented by the governing Smer-SD party in Nitra on May 1, TASR learned on April 28.

The measures are aimed at increasing living standards. The changes should chiefly be carried out via the Labor Code. "I'm absolutely positive that people deserve to be treated like this. If an economy is doing well, we must adopt measures that people will feel in their wallets," Prime Minister Robert Fico(Smer-SD) told a news conference on April 28.

Fico pointed to the fact that Slovakia reported one of the lowest unemployment rates this year and that both the public debt and deficit are falling as well. "If an economy is flourishing, the state needs to reflect these results in higher living standards for people. We want to go further so that we don't threaten public finances," said the prime minister.

According to Fico, the minimum wage should reach 60 percent of average earnings. Bonuses for nighttime or weekend work should also be more generous. "There are no rules favoring these employees at the moment. If people who sit at home during a public holiday receive normal pay for that day, those going to work should earn twice as much. This applies to Sundays and Saturdays as well. We aren't in any crisis. Let's show people that we appreciate their weekend work," stated the prime minister.

Fico pays tribute to Stefanik, refers to him as one of top three Slovaks

The best way for Slovaks to get to know the giants of their history is to visit commemorative sites, like the location of the tragic death of the statesman, Milan Rastislav Stefanik in Ivanka pri Dunaji on May 4, 1919, Prime Minister Robert Fico stated at the site near Bratislava on May 4.

"It's going to be 100 years in May 2019 since the death of one of the most noted Slovaks. I don't want to make a chart on who's been the first, second and third - which place is occupied by(national revivalist Ludovit) Stur, Stefanik and (communist reformist leader Alexander) Dubcek. Stefanik is a hugely inspiring individual for me," said Fico, adding that he's always been motivated by Stefanik's motto: 'I'll fight my way through, because I want to break through.'

Widely regarded as one of the most significant figures of Slovakia's modern history, Stefanik was born in 1880 in Kosariska(Trencin region) and died in a plane crash at Ivanka pri Dunaji in 1919. He was an outstanding astronomer, military pilot, French military general and one of the first Slovaks who several times ascended Mont Blanc. Most notably, he was instrumental in establishing Czechoslovakia in 1918 along with the country's first president, Tomas Garrigue Masaryk and its second president, Edvard Benes.

Tajani: Europe will combat

terrorism together

The summit of the EU's national parliaments in Bratislava on April 24 is sending out a signal that Europe will fight against terrorism together, European Parliament President Antonio Tajani stated at the event, commenting on the setting up of the Joint Parliamentary Scrutiny Group(JPSG) for Europol.

Tajani also urged the secret services from individual member countries to cooperate more closely, "because terrorism doesn't know any borders."

Stating that Europe is living in difficult times, including Brexit, security threats, the unemployment of mainly the young and migration as the chief causes of concern, Tajani said that people expect solutions from the EU's bodies.

Nonetheless, people tend to believe that the EU isn't able to react flexibly enough to their concerns. "This pours oil on the flames of populism," said Tajani, adding that populists are attempting to create the appearance of a discrepancy between the European project and national interests.

"The EU has done a lot for its people, but these results from the past aren't enough for securing a future for the European project as well," said Tajani, adding that more needs to be done. At the same time he stressed that tangible results should be the best response to populism.

John P. Fialkovich, Yonkers, N.Y. fraternal activist, laid to rest at 90

John P. Fialkovich passed away peacefully at his home in Yonkers, N.Y. on April 13 with his family at his side. He was 90.



A native of Youngstown, Oh., John was born there February 27, 1927, son of the late Paul Fialkovich and the former Elizabeth Kostelansky. He was taken

to Slovakia as a child and was raised and educated in a village outside Kosice. In 1948, he came to the United States first settling in Passaic, N.J. He then moved to Yonkers, N.Y. where he married the former Mary Chorey on May 27, 1950 at St. Nicholas of Myra Byzantine Catholic Church. His wife survives.

For the past 67 years, Brother Fialkovich has been a pillar of the Yonkers, N.Y. Slovak community. He was active all his married life at the former Most Holy Trinity Slovak Parish there. He was an active Slovak fraternalist and cultural leader. 94th Pittsburgh Slovak Day set for July 20 at Kennywood Park





Pre zákon o občianstve prišlo o slovenský pas takmer dvetisíc ľudí

Zákon o štátnom občianstve pripravil doteraz (od 17. júna 2010 do 28. apríla2017) o slovenský pas 1766 ľudí. Najčastejšie stratili slovenské občianstvo prijatím českého (464). Vyplýva to zo štatistík Ministerstva vnútra (MV) SR.

O slovenský pas prišli aj osoby, ktoré prijali občianstvo nemecké (422), rakúske (253), britské (164), maďarské (91), americké (74), nórske (41), holandské (36), švajčiarske (33), írske (30), austrálske (29), belgické (28), talianske (23), kanadské (22), fínske (12), švédske (11), francúzske (desať), luxemburské (štyri), čínske, ruské (obe po tri), dánske, islandské, poľské a ukrajinské (všetky po dve), novozélandské, izraelské, španielske, srbské a singapurské (všetky po jednej).


Slovenský pas strácajú ľudia na základe zákona o štátnom občianstve, ktorý prijala prvá vláda Roberta Fica (Smer).

Niekdajší kabinet reagoval právnou normou v roku 2010 na maďarský zákon, ktorý od roku 2011 zjednodušuje udeľovanie dvojakého občianstva zahraničným Maďarom. Na základe súčasného zákona prichádzajú o slovenský pas tí, ktorí prijali občianstvo iného štátu.

Od prijatia zákona sa objavili viaceré pokusy o zmiernenie tejto právnej normy, avšak ani jeden z nich nebol úspešný. Súčasnou právnou normou sa zaoberal aj Ústavný súd SR, ktorý nedokázal povedať, či je protiústavná, alebo nie je. Ministerstvo vnútra avizovanú zmenu zákona nepredložilo.

Od februára 2015 je účinné nariadenie rezortu o udeľovaní štátneho občianstva SR z osobitných dôvodov. Umožňuje, aby bývalí štátni občania SR, ktorí stratili slovenské občianstvo po 1. januári 1993, mohli požiadať o jeho udelenie.

Pri rozhodovaní o žiadosti sa prihliada aj na skutočnosti, ktoré boli dôvodom straty štátneho občianstva Sloivenskej republiky, na spôsob a podmienky, akými žiadateľ cudzí pas nadobudol. "Najmä na existenciu podmienky povoleného, evidovaného alebo registrovaného pobytu v cudzom štáte v čase nadobudnutia cudzieho štátneho občianstva," uviedlo ministerstvo. - Zdroj: sme.sk

Navyše, na tento účel ani nemusíte používať nové filtre. Kávová sedlina je výborné hnojivo aj prostriedok proti škodcom.

Kôš na bielizeň použite na sadenie jahôd. Ak má veľa otvorov, vložte doňho najprv pevné igelitové vrece, nasypte hlinu a ostrým nožom vyrežte otvory len tam, kde sa vám hodia.

Obrátená flaša je lacným riešením na zavlažovanie. Môžete použiť plastové flaše alebo odolnejšie sklenené. Flaše naplnené vodou zastoknete do črepníkov. Treba ich však zabezpečiť, aby ich nezhodil vietor.

Pokazené dáždniky alebo staré slnečníky sú ideálnou pomôckou pre popínavé rastliny. Rúčku zapichnite do zeme, otvorte dáždnik a naťahajte špagátiky alebo drôtiky tak, aby sa po nich mohla vinúť rastlina.

Miroslav Lajčák rokoval s ministrom USA Rexom Tillersonom

25 rokov od nadviazania diplomatických vzťahov oboch krajín a 100 rokov od založenia prvého spoločného štátu Čechov a Slovákov, na ktorého vzniku mal svoj veľký podiel aj vtedajší americký prezident Woodrow Wilson.

V súčasnosti je Slovensko spolahlivým partnerom USA v NATO. M. Lajčák v rozhovore potvrdil, že Slovenská republika naplní svoj záväzok daný na summite NATO vo Walese zvýšiť úroveň výdavkov na obranu na úroveň 1,6 percenta HDP v súlade s modernizačnými plánmi Ozbrojených síl SR.

Bavili sa aj o Rusku a Ukrajine Pri téme Ruska a Ukra-

jiny šéf slovenskej diplomacie konštatoval, že čas nie je na našej strane. "Situácia na východe Ukrajiny hrozí vytvorením zamrznutého konfliktu. Politický proces sa nehýbe z miesta, nevidíme dostatočný pokrok. Napriek tomu by bolo kontraproduktívne zmraziť našu komunikáciu s Ruskom. Naopak, musíme ponechať otvorené kanály na aktívny dialóg," povedal M. Lajčák.

Pokiaľ ide o vzájomnú spoluprácu medzi Slovenskom a USA, slovenský minister poukázal na fakt, že sme spojencami v NATO, realizujeme spoločné aktivity v regiónoch, ktoré sú prioritné pre našu zahraničnú politiku - na Ukrajine i západnom Balkáne -, a máme zhodné pozície v kľúčových záujmových oblastiach, ako sú energetika, bezpečnosť či boj proti terorizmu. "Slovensko je pripravené zintenzívniť spoluprácu s USA a ostatnými spojencami v NATO s cieľom poraziť tzv. Islamský štát a posilniť pravidelné iracké sily. Slovenská vláda sa hlási k tomu, že boj proti terorizmu patrí medzi jej priority a potvrdí to v najbližších dňoch schválením balíčka pomoci pre Irak," uviedol M. Lajčák.

Ministrov program v hlavnom meste USA pokračuje v utorok a v stredu účasťou na konferencii tzv. MSC Core Group, expertnom podujatí na vysokej úrovni o regionálnych i medzinárodných bezpečnostných otázkach. M. Lajčák má vo Washingtone naplánované aj stretnutia s niektorými ďalšími vysokými predstaviteľmi americkej administratívy a zahraničnopolitických think-tankov.

TASR o tom informoval hovorca programu Ministerstva zahraničných vecí a európskych záležitostí SR Peter Susko.

Spomienka na M.R. Štefánika

Výrazne sa zaslúžil o vznik medzivojnovej Československej republiky. Jeho závratnú a úspešnú životnú cestu ukončila 4. mája 1919 tragická letecká nehoda pri pristátí na rodnom území súčasného Slovenska.

Už počas študentských rokov sa výrazne spoločensky angažoval. V roku 1898 začal študovať stavebné inžinierstvo a vstúpil do spolku Detvan.

V roku 1900 prestúpil na Karlovu univerzitu v Prahe, kde navštevoval prednášky z astronómie, fyziky, optiky a matematiky. Štúdium ukončil dizertáciou z astronómie v roku 1904.

Pracoval v meudonskom observatóriu neďaleko Paríža s francúzskym astronómom a fyzikom, profesorom Pierrom Julesom Césarom Janssenom (1824-1907). Počas svojich astronomických výskumných ciest navštívil strednú Áziu, Alžírsko, Tahiti, Nový Zéland, USA i Južnú Ameriku.

Francúzskym občanom sa stal v roku 1912 a o dva roky ho za jeho činnosť vymenovali za rytiera Čestnej légie.

Cez vojnu spolupracoval s T. G. Masarykom a E. Benešom a cieľavedome sa usiloval realizovať spolu s nimi víziu spoločného československého štátu. Štefánik trval na československej jednote vzhľadom na vtedajšiu situáciu Slovákov v Uhorsku a na vojnové ciele veľmocí. To však ešte neurčovalo vnútorné usporiadanie budúceho československého štátu.

Štefánik uvažoval o spojení Čiech, Moravy, Sliezska a Slovenska, pričom každé z týchto území, teda i Slovensko, malo mať vlastný krajinský (zemský) snem. Tieto zatiaľ málo konkretizované predstavy neboli vzdialené od úmyslov niektorých slovenských politikov.

Po príchode zo Sibíri sa Štefánik počas mierovej konferencie v Paríži v marci 1919 kriticky vyjadril o malom počte Slovákov vo vláde, ale aj o Pittsburskej dohode a niektorých Benešových krokoch v oblasti zahraničnej politiky.

Minister vojny ČSR M. R. Štefánik 4. mája 1919 odletel z talianskeho mesta Udine do Bratislavy na dvojplošníku Caproni Ca 33 spolu s dvoma talianskymi letcami a mechanikom. Zomrel pri leteckej nehode v Ivanke pri Dunaji, ktorú neprežil ani jeden z členov posádky. Za Boha a národ

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Povodne na Slovensku si vyžiadali tri životy

Katastrofálne povodne, ktoré 20. apríla zasiahli Žilinský kraj. si vyžiadali tri ľudské životy.

Ó život prišiel poľský turista, ktorý raftoval na rozbúrenej rieke Váh, pád do rieky neprežil. Štyridsaťpäťročného muža záchranári vylovili v Liptovskom Hrádku. Záchranári po 30 minútach neúspešnej resuscitácie skonštatovali smrť.

Ďalšou obeťou je 56-ročný muž z okresu Bytča, ktorý sa utopil v rozbúrenom potoku v obci Hvozdnica. Napriek snahe záchranárov sa ho už nepodarilo oživiť

Rozbúrená rieka v Ochodnici strhla 60-ročného muža, ktorý vošiel do rieky v čase záplav s terénnym autom Suzuki aj s ďalším mužom. Prečo tak muži spravili nie je známe, podľa obyvateľov Ochodnice mali nešťastný nápad, umyť vozidlo zašpinené od blata. Rieka však auto aj s mužmi strhla a to sa prevrátilo. Obaja sa dostali von z vozidla, kým mladšiemu sa podarilo zachytiť stromu pri brehu, starší zmizol pod vodou. Vtedy sa začal boj o jeho život, ktorý trval dlhé hodiny. Napriek enormnej snahe sa v rozbúrenej rieke nepodarilo muža náisť. Hasiči aj tak neprestávali hľadať až do polnoci. Ráno v pátraní pokračovali. Telo muža sa podarilo nájsť až potom, ako hladina rieky opadla a zrážky ustali. Muža našli zachyteného asi 250 metrov od vraku vozidla.

Kritická situácia

Kritická situácia bola v celom Žilinskom kraji. Hasiči zasahovali počas celého dňa. Celkovo zasahovalo viac ako dvesto hasičov. Žilinským hasičom prišli na pomoc aj ich kolegovia z rôznych kútov Slovenska, z Humenného, Malaciek aj z Trnavy, ktorí stavali protipovodňové bariéry.

V Dolnom Kubíne, Tvrdošíne a Námestove sa zosunula na cestu rozmočená zemina. Mimoriadna situácia spočívala v tom, že voda vyčíňava v celom Žilinskom kraji, nie iba lokálne, ako to býva inokedy. Voda narobila poriadne problémy aj v Čadci, rieka Kysuca sa vyliala priamo v centre a dosahovala na niektorých miestach až dva metre. Zatopilo aj železničný podchod.

a na ďalších miestach pripomenulo tragické úmrtie generála Milana Rastislava Štefánika - jednej z najvýznamnejších osobností slovenských novodobých deiín.

Takmer hodinovému rozhovoru dominovali témy boja proti terorizmu a príspevku Slovenskej republiky k boji proti tzv. Islamskému štátu, napĺňania záväzkov zo summitu NATO vo Walese, ale tiež situácia na Ukrajine, vzťahy s Ruskom, vývoj na západnom Balkáne a situácia v Sýrii.

Rex Tillerson ocenil konštruktívnosť slovenskej zahraničnej politiky opierajúcej sa o predvídateľnosť, stabilitu a silné transatlantické väzby, pričom sa s M. Lajčákom zhodli, že vzájomné väzby SR a USA sú dlhodobé a trvácne: v roku 2018 uplynie

Krátke správy zo Slovenska

Výstavba nového závodu japonského koncernu Minea-Mitsumi, ktorý vyrastie pri košickom letisku, sa začala 5. mája. Symbolického výkopu sa zúčastnil aj premiér Fico. Celková výška investície Japoncov do košického závodu má dosiahnuť 60 miliónov eur a počet zamestnancov by mal predstavovať 1100 ľudí. Z toho 100 by sa malo zaoberať výskumom a vývojom.

Nových prípadov HIV infekcie na Slovensku pribúda. Stúpajúci trend pozoruje Úrad verejného zdravotníctva od začiatku 21. storočia. Minulý rok lekári zaznamenali doteraz najvyšší počet prípadov v jednom kalendárnom roku (87), zomreli traja pacienti.

Najviac infikovaných žije vo väčších mestách, najvyšší výskyt je v Bratislavskom kraji. "Slovensko však naďalej patrí k členským štátom Európskej únie s najnižším počtom prípadov HIV infekcie," píše úrad v najnovšej správe. Výskyt HIV či AIDS začali úrady na Slovensku sledovať od roku 1985. Do konca minulého roka ich zaznamenali u 898 ľudí, z toho Slovákov bolo 756 a zvyšok cudzinci. Asi u 100 Slovákov prešla HIV infekcia do štádia AIDS, zomrelo 62 HIV infikovaných ľudí, z toho 48 v štádiu ÁIDS.

Výroba áut na Slovensku by tento rok mala znova prekročiť miliónovú hranicu, informoval o tom vo štvrtok tamojší zväz automobilového priemyslu. Vlani z výrobných liniek troch automobiliek vyšlo rekordných 1,04 milióna áut, čím si Slovensko udržalo v prepočte na obyvateľa pozíciu svetovej jednotky v produkcii vozidiel.

Slovensko sa už veľa krát stalo miestom, kde sa točili scénky Hollywoodských filmov. Výnimkou nie je ani najnovší film Red Sparrow, v ktorom hlavnú úlohu stvárňuje známa americká herečka Jennifer Scénku Lawrence. koncom apríla natáčali v bratislavskej Petržalke pred panelákmi na sídlisku. Ökrem Jennifer Lawrence sa ukázal aj herec Jeremy Irons, ktorý si zahral Álfreda vo filme Batman v Superman.

Objem investícií do komerčných nehnuteľností na Slovensku sa medziročne takmer zdvojnásobil a mal by ďalej rásť. Väčšina investícií má pritom zahraničný pôvod. Upozornila na to realitnoporadenská spoločnosť CBRE Slovensko, podľa ktorej sa Slovensko stáva čoraz väčším lákadlom pre investorov z celého sveta.

Zatiaľ čo v roku 2015 sa na slovenskom trhu komerčných nehnuteľností investovalo 446 miliónov eur, vlani to bolo už 855 miliónov eur. Až 79 % týchto investícií malo zahraničný pôvod. Peniaze, ktoré boli investované na Slovensku minulý rok, pochádzali hlavne z Ázie, Austrálie, Južnej Afriky, Rakúska, Českej republiky a Nemecka.

Cez Slovensko sa 12. mája presúvali spojeneckí vojaci na medzinárodné vojenské cvičenia, plánovacie porady, konferencie a d'alšie aktivity. Početne najväčší bol tranzit vozidiel a materiálu Armády USA.

Americká spoločnosť Amazon spustila nábor zamestnancov do svojho logistického centra pri Seredi. Frima ponúkaplaty vyše 900 eur. Do októbra by mali vytvoriť pracovné miesta pre tisíc zamestnancov a pred Vianocami a do budúcich rokov sa má toto číslo až zdvojnásobiť.

Materskú dávku počas starostlivosti o dieťa poberá na Slovensku čoraz viac mužov. Kým v roku 2015 si materskú dávku uplatnilo 1 731 mužov, vlani to už bolo 3 076 mužov.
